or as much as many have taken in hand to set forth the story of those things, whereof we are fully persuaded,

2 "As they have delivered them unto us, which from the beginning saw them their selves, & were ministers of the <sup>b</sup>word, 3 It seemed good also to me (most noble Theophilus) assone as I had searched out perfitely all things from the beginning, to write unto thee thereof from point to point,

4 That thou mightest acknowledge the certainty of those things, whereof thou hast been instructed.

n the time of °Herod King of Judea, there was a certain Priest named Zacharias, of the dcourse of Abia: and his wife was of the edaughters of Aaron, and her name was Elisabet.

6 Both were fjust before God, and walked in all the commandments and <sup>9</sup>ordinances of the Lord, without reprofe.

7 And they had no child, because that Elisabet was barren: and both were well stricken in age.

8 And it came to pass, as he executed the Priest's office before God, as his course came in order,

9 According to the custom of the Priest's office, his lot was to <sup>h</sup>burn incense, when he went into the <sup>i</sup>Temple of the Lord.

10 And the whole multitude of the people were without in prayer, \*while the incense was burning.

11 Then appeared unto him an Angel of the Lord standing at the right side of the altar of incense.

12 And when Zacharias saw him, he was troubled, and fear fell upon him.

13 But the Angel said unto him, Fear not, Zacharias: for thy prayer is heard, and thy wife Elisabet shall bear thee a son, and thou shalt call his name <sup>k</sup>John.

14 And thou shalt have joy and gladness, and many shall rejoice at his birth.

15 For he shalbe great in the sight of the Lord, and shall neither drink wine, nor <sup>1</sup>strong drink: and he shalbe filled with the holie Ghost, even from his mother's womb.

16 \*And many of the children of Israel shall he turn to their Lord God.

17 \*For he shall go "before him in the spirit and power of Elias, to turn the hearts of the "fathers to the children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just men, to make ready a people prepared for the Lord.

18 Then Zacharias said unto the Angel, Whereby shall I know this? for I am an old man, and my wife is of a great age.

19 And the Angel answered, and said unto him, I am °Gabriel that stand in the presence of God, and am sent to speak unto thee, and to shewe thee these good tidings.

20 And behold, thou shalt be domme, and not be able to speak, until Pthe day that these things be done, because thou believest not my words, which shalbe fulfilled in their season.

21 Now the people waited for Zacharias, and marveled that he tarried so long in the Temple.

22 And when he came out, he could not speak unto them: then they perceived that he had seen a vision in the Temple: for he made signs unto them, and remained domme.

23 And it came to pass, when the days of his office were fulfilled, that he departed qto his own house.

24 And after those days, his wife Elisabet conceived, and hid her self five months, saving,

25 Thus hath the Lord dealt with me, in the days wherein he looked on me, to take from me 'my rebuke among men.

26 ¶ And in the sixth month, the Angel Gabriel was sent from God unto a city of Galile, named Nazaret,

27 To a virgin affianced to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David, and the virgin's name was Marie.

28 And the Angel went in unto her, and said, ^Hail thou that art ^freely beloved: the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women.

29 And when she saw him, she was troubled at his saying, and thought what manner of salutation that should be.

30 Then the Angel said unto her, Fear not, Marie: for sthou hast found favor with God.

31 \*For lo, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bear a son, and shalt call his name JESUS.

32 He shalbe great, and shalbe called the Son <sup>t</sup> of the most High, & the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of his father David. 33 \*And he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever, and of his kingdom shalbe none end.

34 Then said Marie unto the Angel, "How shall this be, seeing, I know no man?

35 And the Angel answered, and said unto her, The holie Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the most High shall <sup>x</sup>overshadow thee: therefore also that <sup>y</sup>holie thing which shalbe born of thee, shalbe called the Son of God.

36 And behold, thy <sup>z</sup>cousin Elisabet, she hath also conceived a son in her old age: and this is her sixth month, which was called barren.

37 For with God shall nothing be unpossible.

38 Then Marie said, Behold, the servant of the Lord: be it unto me according to thy word. So the Angel departed from her.

39 ¶ And Marie arose in those days, and went into the hill *country* with hast to a <sup>a</sup>city in Juda,

40 And entered into the house of Zacharias, & saluted Elisabet. 41 And it came to pass, as Elisabet heard the salutation of Marie, the babe <sup>b</sup>sprang in her bellie, and Elisabet was filled with the holie Ghost.

42 And she cryed with a loud voice, and said, Blessed art thou among women, because the <sup>c</sup>fruit of thy womb is blessed.

43 And whence *cometh* this to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me?

44 For lo, assone as the voice of thy salutation sounded in mine ears, the babe sprang in my bellie for joy.

45 And blessed *is* she that believed: for those things shalbe performed, which were told her <sup>d</sup> from the Lord.

46 Then Marie said, My <sup>e</sup>soul magnifieth the Lord,

47 And my spirit rejoyceth in God my Saviour.

48 For he hath looked on the ^poor degree of his servant: for behold, from hence forth shall all ages call <sup>f</sup>me blessed.

49 Because, he that is mighty, hath done for me great things, and holie *is* his Name.

50 And his <sup>a</sup>mercy *is* from generation to generation on them that fear him.

51 \*He hath shewed strength with his arm: \*he hath scattered the proud in the <sup>h</sup>imagination of their hearts.

52 He hath put down the mighty from *their* seats, and exalted them of low degree.

53 \*He hath filled the hungry with good things, and sent away the rich empty.

54 \*He hath upholden Israel his servant, being mindful of his mercy.

55 (\*And he hath spoken to our fathers, *to wit*, to Abraham and his ^seed) for ever.

56 ¶ And Marie abode with her about three months: after, she

57  $\P$  Now Elisabet's time was fulfilled, that she should be delivered, and she brought forth a son.

58 And her neighbors, and cousins heard tell how the Lord had shewed his great mercy upon her, and they rejoiced with her.

59 And it was so that on the eight day they came to circumcise the babe, and called him Zacharias, after the Name of his father. 60 But his mother answered, and said, Not so, but he shalbe called John.

61 And they said unto her, There is none of thy kindred, that is named with this Name.

62 Then they made signs to his father, how he would have him called.

63 So he asked for writing tables, and wrote, saying, His name is John, and they marveiled all.

64 And his mouth was opened immediately, and his tongue *losed*, and he spake and praised God.

65 Then fear came on all them that dwelt near unto them, and all these words were noised abroad throughout all the hill *country* of Judea.

66 And all they that heard them, laid *them* up in their hearts, saying, What manner child shall this be! and the <sup>k</sup>hand of the Lord was with him.

67 Then his father Zacharias was filled with the holie Ghost, and prophesied, saying,

68 Blessed *be* the Lord God of Israel, because he hath <sup>1</sup>visited \*and redeemed his people,

69 \*And hath raised up the <sup>m</sup>horn of salvation unto us, in the house of his servant David,

70 \*As he spake by the mouth of his holie Prophets, which were since the world began, *saying*,

71 *That he would send us* deliverance from our enemies, and from the hands of all that hate us,

72 That he would shewe "mercy towards our fathers, and remember his holie covenant,

73 \*And the oath which he sware to our father Abraham:

74 *Which was,* that he would grant unto us, that we being delivered out of the hands of our enemies, should °serve him without fear.

75 All the days of our life, in \*holiness and righteousness  $\ensuremath{^{\text{p}}\text{before}}$  him.

76 And thou, babe, shalt be called the Prophet of the most High: for thou shalt go before the face of the Lord, to prepare his ways, 77 *And* to give knowledge of salvation unto his people, by the <sup>a</sup>remission of their sins,

78 Through the tender mercy of our God, whereby \*the 'day

# Chapter 2

7 The birth and circumcision of Christ 22 He was received into the Temple 28 Simeon and Anna prophecie of him. 46 He was found among the doctours. 51 His obedience to father & mother.

And it came to pass in those days, that there came a commandment from Augustus Cesar, that all the "world should be ^taxed.

2 (This first <sup>b</sup>taxing was made when Cyrenius was governor of Syria.)

3 Therefore went all to be taxed every man to his own city.

4 And <sup>c</sup>Joseph also went up from Galile out of a city called Nazaret, into Judea, unto the city of \*David, which is called Bethlehem (because he was of the house and linage of David,)

5 To be taxed with Marie that was given him to wife, which was with child.

6 ¶ And so it was, that while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered.

7 And she brought forth her <sup>d</sup>first begotten son, and wrapped him in swadling clothes and laid him in a <sup>e</sup>cratche, because there was no room for them in the inn.

8 ¶ And there were in the same country shepherds, abiding in the field, and keeping watch by night because of their flock.

9 And lo, the Angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone about them, and they were sore afraid.

10 Then the Angel said unto them, Be not afraid: for behold, I bring you tidings of great joy, that shalbe to all the people:

11 *That is,* that unto you is born this day in the city of <sup>†</sup>David, a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord.

12 And <sup>9</sup>this *shalbe* a sign to you, Ye shall find the child swaddled, and laid in a cratch.

13 And straight way there was with the Angel a multitude of heavenly soldiers, praying God, and saying,

14 Glory *be* to God in the high *heavens*, and peace in earth, and towards men  ${}^{h}$ good will.

15 And it came to pass when the Angels were gone away from them into heaven, that the shepherds said one to another, Let us go then unto Beth-lehem, and see this thing that is come to pass, which the Lord hath shewed unto us.

16 So they came with haste, and found both Marie and Joseph, and the babe laid in the cratch.

17 And when they had seen it, they published abroad the thing, which was told them of that child.

18 And all that heard it, wondered at the things which were told them of the shepherds.

19 But Marie kept all those sayings and pondered *them* in her heart.

20 And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God, for all that they had heard and seen, as it was spoken unto them.

21 ¶ \*And when the eight days were accomplished, that they should circumcise the child, his name was then called \*JESUS, which was named of the Angel, before he was conceived in the womb.

22 \*And when the days of ^her purification after the Law of Moses were accomplished, they brought him to Jerusalem, to present him to the Lord.

23 (As it is written in the Law of the Lord, \*Every man child ^that *first* openeth the womb, shalbe called holie to the Lord:)

24 And to give an oblation, \*as it is commanded in the Law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle doves, or two young pigeons.

25 And behold, there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon: this man *was* just, and feared God, and waited for the consolation of Israel, and the <sup>k</sup>holie Ghost was upon him.

26 And a revelation was given him of the holie Ghost, that he should not see death, before he had seen the Lord's ^Christ.

27 And he came ^by *the motion* of the Spirit into the Temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him after the custom of the Law,

28 Then he took him in his arms, and praised God, and said,

29 Lord,  ${}^{\mbox{\scriptsize how}}$  lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word.

30 For mine eyes have seen thy "salvation,

31 Which thou hast prepared before the face of all the people: 32 ^A light to be revealed to the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel.

33 And Joseph and his mother marveiled at those things, which were spoken touching him.

34 And Simeon <sup>•</sup>blessed them, and said unto Marie his mother, Behold, this *child* is appointed for the <sup>•</sup>\*fall and rising again of many in Israel, and for a sign which shalbe spoken against,

35 (Yea and a <sup>p</sup>sword shall pierce through thy soul) that the <sup>a</sup>thoughts of many hearts may be opened.

36 And there was a Prophetess, one Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Aser, which was of a great age, and had 'lived with an husband seven years from her virginity.

37 And she was widow about four score, and four years, and

38 She then coming at the same instant upon them, ^confessed likewise the Lord, and spake of him to all that looked for redemption in Jerusalem.

39 And when they had performed all things according to the Law of the Lord, they returned into Galile to their own city Nazaret.

40 And the child grew, and waxed strong in Spirit, and was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was with him.

41 ¶ Now his parents went to Jerusalem every year, \*at the feast of the Passover.

42 And when he was twelve year old, and they were come up to Jerusalem, after the custom of the feast,

43 And had finished the days *thereof*, as they returned, the child Jesus remained in Jerusalem, and Joseph knewe not nor his mother,

44 But they supposing, that he had been in the company, went a day's journey, and sought him among *their* kinsfolk, and acquaintance.

45 And when they found him not, they turned back to Jerusalem, and sought him.

46 And it came to pass three days after, that they found him in the Temple, sitting in the middes of the ^doctors, both hearing them, and asking them questions.

47 And all that heard him, were astonied at his understanding, and answers.

48 So when they saw him, they were amazed, and his mother said unto him, Sonne, why hast thou thus dealt with us? behold, thy father and I have sought thee with heavy hearts.

49 Then said he unto them, How is it that ye sought me? 'knewe ye not that I must go about my father's business?

50 But they "understood not the word that he spake to them.

51 Then he went down with them, and came to Nazaret, and was subject to them: and his mother kept all these things in her heart. 52 And Jesus increased in wisdom, and stature, and in favor with God and men.

## Chapter 3

3 The preaching, baptism, and prisonment of John. 15 He is thought to be Christ. 21 Christ is baptized. 23 His age, and genealogy.

N ow in the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, Pontius Pilate being governor of Judea, and <sup>a</sup>Herod being tetrarch of Galile, & his brother Philippe tetrarch of Iturea, and of the country of Trachonitis, and Lysanias the tetrarch of Abilene, 2 (\*When Annas and Caiaphas were the high <sup>b</sup>Priests) the word of God came unto John, the son of Zacharias in the wilderness. 3 \*And he came into all the coasts about Jordan, preaching the baptism fo repentance for the remission of sins,

4 As it is written in the book of the sayings of Esaias the Prophet, which saith, \*The voice of him that cryeth in the wilderness *is*,

# Chapter 3

Prepare ye the way of the Lord: make his paths straight.

5 Every <sup>c</sup>valley shalbe filled, and every mountain, and hill shalbe brought low, and croked things shalbe made straight, and the rough ways *shalbe made* smooth.

6 And ^all flesh shall see the dsalvation of God.

7 Then said he to the people that were come out to be baptized of him,  $^{*}O$  generations of vipers, who hath forewarned you to flee from the wrath to come?

8 Bring forth therefore fruits worthy amendment of life, and begin not to say with your selves, We have Abraham to *our* father: for I say unto you, that God is able of these stones to raise up children unto Abraham.

9 Now also is the <sup>e</sup>axe laid unto the root of the trees: therefore every tree which bringeth not forth good fruit, shalbe hewen down and cast into the fire.

10 ¶ Then the people asked him, saying, What shall we do then? 11 And he answered, and said unto them, \*He <sup>t</sup> that hath two coats, let him part with him that hath none: and he that hath meat, let him do likewise.

12 Then came there <sup>9</sup>Publicans also to be baptized, and said unto him, Master, what shall we do?

13 And he said unto them, Require no more then that which is appointed unto you.

14 The soldiers likewise demanded of him, saying, And what shall we do? And he said unto them Do violence to no man, neither accuse any falsely, and be content with your wages.

15 As the people waited, and all men mused in their hearts of John, if he were not the Christ,

16 John answered, and said to them all, \*In deed I <sup>h</sup>baptize you with water, but one stronger then I, cometh, whose shoe's latchet I am not worthy to unloose: he will baptize you with the holie Ghost, and <sup>i</sup>with fire.

17 \*Whose fan *is* in his hand, and he will make clean his floor, and will gather the wheat into his garner, but the chaff will he burn up with fire that never shalbe quenched.

18 Thus then exhorting with many other things, he preached unto the people.

19 \*But when <sup>k</sup>Herod the tetrarch was rebuked of him for Herodias his brother Philippe's wife, and for all the evils which Herod had done,

20 He added yet this above all, that he shut up John in prison. 21 \*Now it came to pass, as all the people were baptized, & that Jesus was baptized and did pray, that the heaven was opened: 22 And the holie Ghost came down in a bodily shape like a dove, upon him, and there was a voice from heaven, saying, Thou art my beloved Son: in thee I am well pleased.

23 ¶ And Jesus him self began to be about thirty year of age,

## Chapter 4

1 Jesus is led into the wilderness to be tempted 13 He overcometh the devil. 14 He goeth into Galile, 16 Preacheth at Nazaret, and Capernaum. 22 The Jewes despise him. 38 He cometh into Peter's house, and healeth his mother in law. 41 The devils acknowledge Christ. 43 He preacheth through the cities.

And Jesus ful of the holie Ghost returned from Jordan, and Awas led by the Spirit into the wilderness, 2 \*And was *there* fourtie dayes tempted of the devil, and in those dayes <sup>a</sup>he did eat nothing: but when they were ended, he afterward was hungrie. 3 Then the devil said unto him, If thou be the Son of God, commande this stone that it be made bread.

4 But Jesus answered him, saying, It is written, \*That man shal not live by bread only, but by every <sup>b</sup>word of God.

5 Then the devil took him up into an high mountaine, & shewed

him all the kingdoms of the world, ^in the twinkeling of an eye. 6 And the devil said unto him, All this power will I <sup>°</sup>give thee, and the glory of those *kingdoms:* for that is delivered to me: and to whomsoever I will, I give it,

7 If thou therefore wilt ^worship me, they shalbe all thine.

8 But Jesus answered him, and said, ^Hence from me, Satan: for it is written, \*Thou shalt worship the Lord thy <sup>d</sup>God, and him alone thou shalt serve.

9 Then he brought him to °Jerusalem, and set him on a pinacle of the Temple, and said unto him, If thou be the Son of God, cast thy self down from hence,

10 For it is written, \*That he will give his Angels charge over thee to keep thee:

11 And with *their* hands they shal lift thee up, lest at any time thou shuldest dash thy foot against a stone.

12 And Jesus answered and said unto him, It is said, \*Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God.

13 And when the devil had ended all the tentacion, he departed from him <sup>f</sup>for a season.

14 ¶ And Jesus returned by the power of the spirit into Galile: & there went a fame of him throughout all the region round about. 15 For he taught in their Synagogues, and was honoured of all men.

16 \*And he came to Nazaret where he had been brought up, and (as his custom was) went into the Synagogue on the Sabbath day, and stood up to read.

17 And there was delivered unto him the book of the Prophet Esaias: and when he had opened the book, he found the place, where it was written,

18 \*The Spirit of the Lord *is* upon me, because he hath <sup>g</sup>annointed me, that I should preach the Gospel to the poor: he hath sent me, that I should heal the broken hearted, that I should preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, that I should set at liberty them that are bruised,

19 And that I should preach the <sup>h</sup>acceptable year of the Lord. 20 And he closed the book, and gave it again to the minister, and sat down: and the eyes of all that were in the Synagogue were fastened on him.

21 Then he began to say unto them, This day is this Scripture fulfilled in your ears.

22 And all <sup>i</sup>bare him witness, and wondered at the gracious words, which proceded out of his mouth, and said, Is not this Joseph's son?

23 Then he said unto them, Ye will surely say unto me this proverb, Physicion, <sup>k</sup>heal thy self: whatsoever we have heard done in Capernaum, do it here likewise in thine own country.

24 And he said, Verely I say unto you, \*No <sup>1</sup>Prophet is accepted in his own country.

25 But I tell you of a truth, many widows were in Israel in the days of \*Elias, when heaven was shut three years and six moneths, when great famine was throughout all the land,

26 But unto none of them was Elias sent, save into Sarepta, *a city of* Sidon, unto a <sup>m</sup>certain widow.

27 Also many lepers were in Israel, in the time of \*Eliseus the Prophet: yet none of them was made clean, saving Naaman the Syrian.

28 Then all *that were* in the Synagogue, when they heard it, were <sup>n</sup>filled with wrath,

29 And rose up, and thrust him out of the city, and led him unto the edge of the hill, whereon their city was built, to cast him down headlong.

30 But he passed °through the middes of them, & went his way, 31¶ \*And came down into Capernaum a city of Galile, and there taught them on the Sabbath days.

32 \*And they were astonied at his doctrine: for his word was with <sup>P</sup>authority.

33 And in the Synagogue there was a man which had a <sup>q</sup>spirit of an unclean devil, which cryed with a loud voyce,

34 Saying, Oh, what have we to do with thee, thou Jesus of Nazaret? art thou come to destroy us? I know who thou art, *even* the Holie one of God.

35 And Jesus rebuked him, saying, Hold thy peace, and come out of him. Then the devil throwing him in the middes *of them,* came out of him, and hurt him not.

36 So fear came on them all, and they spake among them selves, saying, What thing is this? for with authority and power he commandeth the foul spirits, and they come out?

37 And the fame of him spread abroad throughout all the places of the country round about.

38 ¶ \*And he rose up, and came out of the Synagogue, and entered into Simon's house. And Simon's wive's mother was taken with a great fever, and they required him for her.

39 Then he stood over her, and rebuked the fever, and it left her: and immediately she arose, and ministered unto them.

40 Now when the sun was down, all they that had sick *folkes* of divers diseases, brought them unto him, and he laied his hands on every one of them, and healed them.

41 \*And devils also came out of many, crying, and saying, 'Thou art the Christ the Son of God: but he rebuked them, and suffered them not to say that they knewe him to be the Christ.

42 And when it was day, he departed and went forth into a desert place, and the people sought him, and came to him, and kept him that he should not depart from them.

43 But he said unto them, Surely I must also preach the kingdom of God to other cities: for therefore am I sent.

44 And he preached in the Synagogues of Galile.

## Chapter 5

1 Christ preacheth out of the ship. 6 The great draught of fish 10 Certain disciples are called 12 He clenseth the leper 18 He healeth the man of the palsie 27 He calleth Matthewe the customer, 30 Eateth with sinners, 34 And excuseth his, as touching fasting.

Then \*it came to pass, as the people preassed upon him to hear the word of God, that he stode by the lake of Gennesaret,

2 And saw two ships stand by the lake side, but the fishermen were gone out of them, and were washing their nettes.

3 And <sup>a</sup>he entered into one of the ships, which was Simon's, and required him that he would thrust off a little from the land: and he sat down, and taught the people out of the ship.

4 ¶ Now when he had left speaking, he said unto Simon, Lanche out into the deep, and let down your nets to make a draught.

5 Then Simon answered, and said unto him, <sup>b</sup>Master, we have travailed all night, and have taken nothing: nevertheles at thy <sup>c</sup>word I will let down the net.

6 And when they had so done, they inclosed a great multitude of fishes, so that their net brake.

7 And they beckened to their parteners, which were in the other ship, that they should come and help them, who came then, and filled both the ships, that they did dsink.

8 Now when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus knees, saying, Lord, go from me: for I am a sinful man.

9 For he <sup>e</sup>was utterly astonied, and all that were with him, for the draught of fishes, which they took.

10 And so was also James and John the sons of Zebedeus, which were the companions with Simon. Then Jesus said unto Simon, Fear not: from <sup>1</sup>hence forth thou shalt catch men.

11 And when they had brought the ships to land, they forsook all, and followed him.

12 ¶ \*Now it came to pass, as he was in a certain city, beholde, *there was* a man full of leprosy, and when he saw Jesus, he fell on his face, and besought him, saying, Lord if thou wilt, thou canst make me clean.

13 So he stretched forth his hand, & touched him, saying, I will, be thou clean. And immediately the leprosy departed from him. 14 And he commanded him that he should tell it no man: but Go, *saith he,* and shewe thy self to the <sup>a</sup>Priest, and offer for thy cleansing, as \*Moses hath commanded, for a witness unto them. 15 But so much more went there a fame abroad of him, and great multitudes came together to hear, and to be healed of him of their infirmities.

16 But he kept him self apart in the wilderness, and praied.

17 ¶ And it came to pass, on a certain day, as he was teaching, that the Pharises and doctours of the Law sat by, which were come out of every town of Galile, and Judea, and Jerusalem, and the power of the Lord was *in him* to heal them.

18 \*Then behold, men brought a man lying in a bed, which was

taken with a palsie, and they sought means to bring him in, and to lay him before him.

19 And when they could not find by what way they might bring him in, because of the press, they went up on the house, and let him down through the tiling, bed and all, in the middes before Jesus.

20 And when he saw their faith, he said unto him, Man, thy  $^{\rm h}{\rm sins}$  are forgiven thee.

21 Then the Scribes and the Pharises began to think, saying, Who is this that speaketh blasphemies? who can forgive sins, but God only?

22 But when Jesus perceived their thoughts, he answered, and said unto them, What think ye in your hearts?

23 Whether is easier to say, Thy sins are forgiven thee, or to say, Rise and walk?

24 But that ye may know that the Son of man hath authority to forgive sins in earth, (he said unto the sick of the palsy) I say to thee, Arise: take up thy bed, and go to thine house.

25 And immediately he rose up before them, and took up *his bed* whereon he laie, and departed to his own house, praising God. 26 And they were all amased, & praised God, & were filled with fear, saying, Douteless we have seen ^strange things to day.

27  $\P$  \*And after that, he went forth and saw a Publican named ^Levi, sitting at the receite of custome, and said unto him, Follow me.

28 And he left all, rose up, and followed him.

29 Then Levi made him a great feast in his own house, where there was a great company of Publicans, and of other, that sat at table with them.

30 But they that were Scribes & Pharises among them, murmured against his disciples, saying, Why eat ye and drink ye with Publicans and sinners?

31 Then Jesus answered, and said unto them, They that are whole, need not the physicion, but they that are sick.

32 \*I came not to call the <sup>k</sup>righteous, but sinners to repentance. 33 ¶ \*Then they said unto him, Why do the disciples of John fast often, and ^pray, and the *disciples* of the Pharises also, but thine eat, and drink?

34 And he said unto them, Can ye make the <sup>1</sup>children of the wedding chamber to fast, as long as the bridegroom is with them?

35 But the days will come, even when the bridegroom shalbe taken away from them: then shall they fast in those days.

36 Again he spake also unto them a parable, No man putteth a piece of a new garment into an old vesture: for then the new renteth it, & the piece *taken* out of the new, agreeth not with the old. 37 <sup>m</sup>Also no man poureth new wine into old vessels: for then the new wine will break the vessels, and it will run out, and the vessels will perish.

38 But new wine must be poured into new vessels: so both are preserved.

39 Also no man that "drinketh old wine, straight way desireth

## **Chapter 6**

3 Christ standeth in his disciples defence and his own, as touching the breache of the Sabbath 12 After watching and prayer he electeth his Apostles 18 He healeth and teacheth the people 20 He sheweth who are blessed 27 To love our enemies. 37 Not to judge rashly, 41 And to avoid hyprocrisy.

And \*it came to pass on the second <sup>a</sup>Sabbath, after the first, that he went through the corn fields, & his disciples plucked the ears of corn, and did eat, and rubbe them in *their* hands.

2 And certain of the Pharises said unto them, Why do ye that which is not lawful to do on the Sabbath days?

3 Then Jesus answered them, and said, \*Have ye not read this, that David did when he him self was an hungred, and they which were with him,

4 How he went into the house of God, and took, and ate the shewe bread, and gave also to them which were with him, which was not lawful to eat, but for the \*Priests only?

5 And he said unto them, The Son of man is <sup>b</sup>Lord also of the Sabbath day.

6  $\P$  \*And it came to pass also on another Sabbath, that he entered into the Synagogue and taught, and there was a man, whose right hand was dryed up.

7 And the Scribes and Pharises watched him, whether he would heal on the Sabbath *day*, that they might find an accusation *against* him.

8 But he knewe their thoughts, and said to the man which had the withered hand, Arise, and stand up in the middes. And he arose, and stood up.

9 Then said Jesus unto them, I will ask you a question, Whether is it lawful on the Sabbath days to do good, or to do evil? to save ^life, or to destroy it?

10 And he beheld them all in compass, and said unto the man, Stretch forth thine hand. And he did so, and his hand was restored again, as whole as the other.

11 Then they were filled full of madness, and communed one with another, what they might do to Jesus.

12  $\P$  And it came to pass in those days, that he went into a mountain to pray, and spent the night in prayer to God.

13 \*And when it was day, he called his disciples, and of them he chose  $^{\circ}$ twelve, which he also called  $^{d}$ Apostles.

14 (Simon whom he named also Peter, and Andrewe his brother, James and John, Phillippe, and Bartlemewe:

15 Matthewe, and Thomas: James *the son* of Alpheus, and Simon the zealous,

16 Judas James' *brother*, and Judas Iscariot, which also was a traytour.)

17 Then he came down with them, & stood in ^a plain place, with the company of his disciples, and a great multitude of people out

of all Judea, and Jerusalem, & from the sea coast of Tyrus & Sidon, which came to hear him, & to be healed of their diseases: 18 And they that were vexed with foul spirits, & they were healed. 19 And the whole multitude sought to touch him: for there went virtue out of him, and healed them all.

20 ¶ \*And he lifted up his eyes upon his disciples, and said, Blessed *be* ye  $^{\circ}$ poor: for yours is the kingdom of God.

21 \*Blessed *are* ye that hunger now: for ye shalbe satisfied: blessed *are* ye that \*weep now: for ye shall laugh.

22 \*Blessed are ye when men hate you, and when <sup>f</sup>they separate you, and revile *you*, and put out your name as evil, for the Son of man's sake.

23 Rejoice ye in that day, and be <sup>9</sup>glad: for behold, your reward *is* great in heaven: for after this manner their fathers did to the Prophets.

24 \*But wo be to you that are <sup>h</sup>rich: for ye have received your consolation.

25 \*Wo be to you that are full: for ye shall hunger. Wo be to you that now <sup>h</sup>laugh: for ye shal wail and weep.

26 Wo be to you when all <sup>k</sup>men speak well of you: for so did their fathers to the false prophets.

27 ¶ \*But I say unto you which hear, Love your enemies: do well to them which hate you.

28 Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which hurt you. 29 \*And unto him that 'smiteth thee on the *one* cheek, offer also the other: \*and him that taketh away thy cloak, forbid not *to take thy* coat also.

30 Give to every man that asketh of thee: and of him that taketh away thy *goods*, <sup>m</sup>ask them not again.

31 \*And as ye would that men should do to you, so do ye to them likewise.

32 \*For if ye love them which love you, what thank shall ye have? for even the "sinners love those that love them.

33 And if ye do good for them which do good for you, what thank shall ye have? for even the sinners do the same.

34 \*And if ye lend to *them* of whom ye hope to receive, what thank shall ye have? for even the sinners lend to sinners, to sinners, to receive the like.

35 Wherefore love ye your enemies, & do good, & lend, °looking

for nothing again, and your reward shalbe great, and ye shalbe the children of \*the most High: for he is kind unto the unkind, and to the evil.

36 Be ye therefore merciful, as your Father also is merciful.

37 ¶ \*Judge not, and ye shall not be judged: condemn not, and ye shall not be condemned: forgive, and ye shalbe forgiven.

38 Give, and it shalbe given unto you: \*a good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over shall men give into your bosom: for with what measure ye mette, with the same shall men mette to you again.

39 And he spake a parable unto them, \*Can the blind lead the blind? shall they not both fall into the ditch?

40 \*The disciple is not above his master: but whosoever *wilbe* a perfect disciple, shall be as his master.

41 ¶ \*And why <sup>p</sup>seest thou a mote in thy brother's eye, and considerest not the beam, that is in thine own eye?

42 Either how canst thou say to thy brother, Brother, let me pull out the mote that is in thine eye, when thou seest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Hypocrite, cast out the beam out of thine own eye first, and then shalt thou see perfectly, to pull out the mote that is in thy brother's eye.

43  $\P$  \*For it is not a good tree that bringeth forth evil fruit: neither an evil tree, that bringeth forth good fruit.

44 \*For every tree is knowen by his own fruit: \*for neither of thorns gather men figs, not of bushes gather they grapes.

45 A <sup>q</sup>good man out of the good treasure of his heart bringeth forth good, and an evil man out of the evil treasure of his heart bringeth forth evil: for of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaketh.

46 ¶ \*But why call ye me 'Master, Master, and do not the things that I speak?

47 Whosoever cometh to me, and heareth my words, and doeth the same, I will shewe you to whom he is like.

48 He is like a man which built an house, and digged deep, and laid the foundation on a rock: and when the waters arose, the flood bet upon that house, and could not shake it: for it was grounded upon a rock.

49 But he that heareth and doeth not, is like a man that built an house upon the earth without foundation, against which the flood did beat, and it fell by and by: & the fall of that house was great.

2 And a certain "Centurion's servant was sick and ready to dye, which was dear unto him.

3 And when he heard of Jesus, he sent unto him the Elders of the Jewes, beseeching him that he would come and heal his servant.

4 So they came to Jesus, and besought him instantly, saying that he was worthie that he should do this for him.

5 For he loveth, *said they*, our nation, and he hath built us a <sup>b</sup>Synagogue.

6 Then Jesus went with them: but when he was now not far from the house, the Centurion sent friends to him, <sup>c</sup>saying unto him, Lord, trouble not thy self: for I am not worthie that thou shouldest enter under my roof.

7 Wherefore I thought not my self worthie to come unto thee: but <sup>d</sup>say the word, and my servant shalbe whole.

8 For I likewise am a man set under authority, & have under me soldiers, and I say unto one, Go, and he goeth, and to another, Come, & he cometh, & to my servant, Do this, and he doeth it.

9 When Jesus heard these things, he marveiled at him, and turned him, and said to the people, that followed him, I say unto you, I have not found so <sup>e</sup>great faith, no not in Israel.

10 And when they that were sent, turned back to the house, they found the servant that was sick, whole.

11 And it came to pass the day after, that he went into a city called 'Nain, and many of his disciples went with him, and a great multitude.

12 Now when he came near to the gate of the city, behold, there was a dead man carried out, *who was* the only begotten son of his mother, which was a widow, and much people of the city was with her.

13 And when the Lord saw her, he had compassion on her, and said unto her, Weep not.

14 And he went and touched the ^coffin (and they that bare him, stood still) and he said, <sup>g</sup>Young man, I say unto thee, Arise.

15 And he that was dead, sat up, and began to speak, and he delivered him to his mother.

16 Then there came a fear on them all, and they glorified God, saying, A great Prophet is raised up among us, and God hath <sup>h</sup>visited his people.

17 And this rumor of him went forth throughout all Judea, and throughout all the region round about.

18 ¶ And the disciples of John shewed him of all these things.

19 So John called unto him two certain men of his disciples, and sent them to Jesus, saying, Art thou he that should come, or shall we wait for another?

20 And when the men were come unto him, they said, John Baptist hath sent us unto thee, saying, Art thou he that should come, or shall we wait for another?

21 And at that time, he cured many of their sickness, and plagues, and of evil spirits, & unto many blind men he gave sight. 22 And Jesus answered, and said unto them, Go your ways and shewe John, <sup>k</sup>what things ye have seen and heard: that the blind

see, the halt go, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead rise again, and the  $^{h}$ poor receive the Gospel.

23 And blessed is he, that shall not be "offended in me.

24 And when the messengers of John were departed, he began to speak unto the people of John, What went ye out into the wilderness to see? A "reed shaken with the wind?

25 But what went ye out to see? A man clothed in soft raiment? behold, they which are gorgeously appareled, and live delicately, are in King's courts.

26 But what went ye forth to see? A Prophet? yea, I say to you, and greater then a Prophet.

27 This is he of whom it is written, \*Behold, I sent my Amessenger before thy face, which shall prepare thy way before thee.

28 For I say unto you, there is no greater Prophet then John, among them that are ^begotten of women: nevertheless, he that is the least in the kingdom of God is greater then he.

29 Then all the people that heard, and the Publicans °justified God, being baptized with the <sup>p</sup>baptism of John.

30 But the Pharises and the expounders of the Law despised the counsel of God <sup>q</sup>against them selves, & *were* not baptized of him. 31 \*And the Lord said, Whereunto shall I liken the men of this generation? and what *thing* are they like unto?

32 They are like unto children sitting in the market place, and crying one to another, & saying, 'We have piped unto you, & ye have not danced: we have mourned to you, & ye have not wept. 33 For John Baptist came, neither eating bread, not drinking wine: and ye say, He hath the devil.

34 The Son of man is come, and <sup>s</sup>eateth and drinketh: and ye say, Behold, a man *which is* a glutton, and a drinker of wine, a friend of Publicans and sinners.

35 But wisdom is 'justified of all her children.

36 ¶ \*And one of the Pharises desired him that he would eat with him: and he went into the Pharise's house, and sat down at table. 37 And behold, a woman in the city, which was a sinner, when she knewe that Jesus sat at table in the Pharise's house, she brought a box of ointment.

38 \*And she stood at his feet behind him weeping, and began to wash his feet with tears, and did wipe them with the hairs of her head, and kissed his feet, and anointed them with the ointment. 39 Now when the Pharise which bade him, saw it, he spake within him self, saying, If this man were a Prophet, he would surely have knowen who, and what manner of woman this is which toucheth him: for she is a sinner.

40 And Jesus answered, and said unto him, Simon, I have somewhat to say unto thee. And he said, Master, say on.

41 There was a certain lender which had two detters: the one

oght five hundreth pence, and the other fifty.

42 When they had nothing to pay, he forgave them both. Which of them therefore, tell *me*, will love him most?

43 Simon answered, and said, I suppose that he, to whom he forgave most. And he said unto him, Thou hast truly judged.

44 Then he turned to the woman, and said unto Simon, Seest thou this woman? I entered into thine house, and thou gavest me no water to my feet: but she hath washed my feet with tears, and wiped them with the hairs of her head.

45 Thou gavest me no kiss: but she since the time I came in, hath not ceased to kiss my feet.

46 Mine head with oil thou didest not anoint: but she hath anointed my feet with ointment.

47 Wherefore I say unto thee, many sins are forgiven her: for she "loved much. To whom a little is forgiven, he doeth love a little. 48 And he said unto her, Thy sins are forgiven thee.

49 And they that sat at table with him, began to say within them selves, Who is this that even forgiveth sins?

50 And he said to the woman, Thy faith hath saved thee: go in <sup>\*</sup>peace.

2 And certain women, which were healed of evil spirits, and infirmities, *as* \*Marie which was called Magdalene, out of whom went seven devils,

3 And Joanna the wife of Chuza Herod's steward, and Susanna, and many other which <sup>a</sup>ministered unto ^him of their substance. 4 \*Now when much people were gathered together, and were come to him out of all cities, he spake by a parable,

5 A sower went out to sow his seed, and as he sowed, some fell by the way side, and it was trodden under feet, and the fowls of heaven devoured it up.

6 And some fell on the stones, and when it was sprong up, it withered away, because it lacked moistness.

7 And some fell among thorns, and the thorns sprang up with it, and choked it.

8 And some fell on good ground, and sprang up, and bare fruit, an hundreth fold. And as he said these things, he cryed, He that hath ears to <sup>b</sup>hear, let him hear.

9 Then his disciples asked him, demanding, what parable that was?

10 And he said, Unto you it is given to know the secrets of the kingdom of God, but to other in <sup>c</sup>parables, that when \*they see, they should not see, and when they hear, they should not

11 \*The parable is this, The seed is the word of God. 12 And they that are beside the way, are they that hear:

afterward commeth the devil, and taketh away the word out of their hearts, lest they should believe, and be saved?

13 But they that are on the stones, *are they* which when they have heard, receive the word with joy: but they have no roots, which for a while <sup>d</sup>believe, but in the time of tentation go away.

14 And that which fell among thorns, are they which have heard, and <sup>e</sup>after their departure are choked with cares and with riches, and voluptuous living, and bring forth no fruit.

15 But that *which fell* in good ground, are they which with an honest and good heart hear the word, and keep it, and bring forth fruit with patience.

16 ¶ \*No <sup>f</sup>man when he lighteth a candle, covereth it under a vessel, neither putteth it under the  $^{table}$ , but setteth it on a candlestick, that they that enter in, may see the light.

17 \*For nothing is secret, that shall not be evident: neither any thing hid, that shall not be knowen, and come to light.

18 Take heed therefore how ye hear: \*for whosoever hath, to him shalbe given: and whosoever hath not, from him shalbe taken even that, which <sup>g</sup>it seemeth that he hath.

19  $\P$  \*Then came to him his mother and his brethren, and could not come near to him for the press.

20 And it was told him *by certain* which said, Thy mother and thy ^brethren stand without, and would see thee.

21 But he answered, and said unto them, My mother, and my brethren are  $^{h}$ these which hear the word of God, and do it.

22  $\P$  \*And it came to pass on a certain day, that he went into a ship with his disciples, and he said unto them, Let us go over unto the other side of the lake. And they launched forth.

31 And they besought him, that he would not command them to go out into the <sup>n</sup>diepe.

36 They also which saw it, told them by what means he that was possessed with the devil, was healed.

37 Then the whole multitude of the country about the Gadarenes, besought him, that he would depart from them: for they were taken with a great fear: and he went into the ship, and returned. 38 Then the man, out of whom the devils were departed, besought him that he might be with him: but Jesus sent him away, saying,

39 °Return into thine own house, & shewe what great things God hath done to thee. So he went his way, and preached through out all the <sup>p</sup>city, what great things Jesus had done unto him.

40 ¶ And it came to pass when Jesus was come again, that the people received him: for they all waited for him.

41 ¶ \*And behold, there came a man named Jairus, and he was the ruler of the <sup>q</sup>Synagogue, who fell down at Jesus' feet, and besought him that he would come into his house.

42 For he had but a daughter only, about twelve years of age, and she lay a dying (and as he went, the people thronged him. 43 And a woman having an issue of blood, twelve years long, which had spent all her substance upon physicions, and could not be healed of any:

44 When she came behind *him*, she touched the 'hem of his garment, and immediately her issue of blood stanched.

45 Then Jesus said, Who is it that hath touched me? When every man denied, Peter said and they that were with him, Master, the multitude thrust thee, and tread on thee, and sayest thou, Who hath touched me?

46 And Jesus said, Some one hath touched me: for I perceive that virtue is gone out of me.

47 When the woman saw that she was not hid, she came trembling, and fell down before him, and told him before all the people,

for what cause she had touched him, and how she was healed immediately.

48 And he said unto her, Daughter, be of good comfort: thy <sup>s</sup>faith hath made thee whole: go in peace.)

49 While he yet spake, there came one from the ruler of the Synagogue's house, which said to him, Thy daughter is dead: disease not the Master.

50 When Jesus heard it, he answered 'him, saying, Fear not: believe only, and she shall be made whole.

51 And when he went into the house, he suffered no man to go in with him, save Peter, and James, and John, and the father and mother of the maid.

52 And all wept, and sorrowed for her: but he said, Weep not: for she is not "dead, but sleepeth.

53 And they laught him to scorn, knowing that she was dead.

10 ¶ \*And when the Apostles returned, they told him what great things they had done. \*Then he took them, and went aside into a solitarie place. *near* to the city called Bethsaida.

11 But when the people knewe it, they followed him: and he received them, and spake unto them of the kingdom of God, and healed them that had need to be healed.

12 \*And when the day began to wear away, the twelve came, and said unto him, Send the people away, that they may go into the towns and villages round about, and lodge, and get meat: for we are here in a desert place.

15 And they did so, and caused all to sit down.

16 Then he took the five loaves, and the two fishes, and looked up to heaven, and <sup>e</sup>blessed them, and brake, and gave to the disciples, to set before the people.

17 So they did all eat, and were satisfied: and there was taken up of that remained to them, twelve baskets full of broken meat.

18 ¶ \*And it came to pass as he was alone praying, his disciples were with him, and he asked them, saying, Whom say the people that I am?

19 They answered, and said, John Baptist: and others say, Elias: and some say, that one of the old Prophets is risen again.

20 And he said unto them, But whom say ye that I am? Peter answered, and said, The Christ of God.

21 And he warned, and commanded them, that they should tell <sup>t</sup>that to no man,

22 Saying, \*The Son of man must suffer many things, and be reproved of the Elders, and of the high Priests and Scribes, and be slain, and the third day rise again.

23 ¶ \*And he said to them all, If any man will come after me, let him deny him self, and take up his cross  ${}^{g}$ daily, and follow me.

24 For whosoever will save his life, shall loose it: and whosoever shall loose his life for my sake, the same shall save it.

25 For what avantageth it a man, if he win the whole world, and destroy him self, or loose him self?

26 \*For whosoever shalbe ashamed of me, and of my words, of him shall the Son of man be ashamed, when he shall come in his glory, and *in the glory* of the Father, and of the holie Angels.

27 \*And I tell you of a surety, there be some standing here, which shall not taste of death, till they have seen the <sup>h</sup>kingdom of God. 28 \*And it came to pass about an eight days after those words, that he took Peter, and John, and James, and went up into a mountain to pray.

29 And as he prayed, the facion of his countenance was changed, and his garment was white and glistered.

30 And behold, two men talked with him, which were Moses and Elias,

32 But Peter and they that were with him, were heavy with sleep, and when they awoke, they saw his glory, and the two men standing with him.

33 And it came to pass, as they departed from him, Peter said unto Jesus, Master, it is good for us to be here: let us therefore make three tabernacles, one for thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elias, and wist not what he said.

34 While he thus spake, there came a cloud and <sup>k</sup>overshadowed them, and they feared when these were entering into the cloud. 35 \*And there came a voice out of the cloud, saying, This is my beloved Son, hear him.

36 And when the voice was past, Jesus was found alone: and they kept it close, and told no man in those days any of those things which they had seen.

37  $\P$  And it came to pass on the next day, as they came down from the mountain, much people met him.

40 Now I have besought thy disciples to cast him out, but they could not.

41 Then Jesus answered, and said,  $^{m}$ O generation faithless, and crooked, how long now shall I be with you, and suffer you! bring thy son hither.

42 And whiles he was yet coming, the devil rent him, and tare him: and Jesus rebuked the unclean spirit, and healed the child, and delivered him to his father.

43 ¶ And they were all amazed at the mighty power of God: and while they all wondered at all things, which Jesus did, he said unto his disciples,

44 ^Mark these words diligently: for it shall come to pass, that the Son of man shalbe delivered into the hands of men.

45 But they "understood not that word: for it was hid from them, so that they could not perceive it: and they feared to ask him of that word.

46  $\P$  \*Then there arose a disputation among them, which of them should be the greatest.

47 When Jesus saw the thoughts of their hearts, he took a little child, and set him by him,

48 And said unto them, Whosoever receiveth this little child in my Name, receiveth me: and whosoever shall receive me, receiveth him that sent me: for he that is least among you all, he shalbe great.

49  $\P$  \*And John answered, and said, Master, we saw one casting out devils in thy Name, and we forbade him, because he followeth *thee* not with us.

50 Then Jesus said unto him, Forbid ye him not: for he that is not against us, °is with us.

62 And Jesus said unto him, No man that putteth his hand to the plough, and <sup>x</sup>loketh back, is apt to the kingdom of God.

8 But into whatsoever city ye shall enter, if they receive you, <sup>h</sup>eat such things as are set before you,

9 And heal the sick that are there, and say unto them, The kingdom of God is come near unto you.

10 But into whatsoever city ye shall enter, if they will not receive you, go your ways out into the streets of the same, and say,

11 Even the very \*dust, which cleaveth on us of your city, we wipe off against you: notwithstanding know this, that the kingdom of God was come near unto you.

12 For I say to you, that it shalbe easier in that day for them of Sodom, then for that city.

13 \*Wo *be* to thee, Chorazin: wo *be* to thee, Beth-saida: for if the miracles had been done in Tyrus and Sidon, which have been done in you, they had a great while agone repented, sitting <sup>k</sup>in sack cloth and ashes.

14 Therefore it shalbe easier for Tyrus, <sup>l</sup>and Sidon, at the judgement, then for you.

15 And thou, Capernaum, which art exalted to heaven, shalt be thrust down to hell.

16  $\P$  \*He that heareth you, heareth me: and he that despiseth you, despiseth me: and he that despiseth me, despiseth him that sent me.

17  $\P$  And the seventie turned again with joy, saying, Lord, even the devils are subdued to us through thy Name.

18 And he said unto them, I saw "Satan, like lightening, fall down from heaven.

19 Behold, I give unto you power to tread on serpents, and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemie, and nothing shall hurt you.

20 Nevertheless, in this rejoice not, that the spirits are subdued unto you: but rather rejoice, because your names are written in heaven.

21 ¶ That same hour rejoiced Jesus in Athe spirit, and said, I confess unto thee, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that thou hast hid these things from the "wise & learned, and hast revealed them to babes: even so, Father, because it so pleased thee.

me of my Father: and <sup>p</sup>no man knoweth who the Son is, but the Father: neither who the Father is, save the <sup>q</sup>Son, and he to whom the Son will reveal him.

23 ¶ And he returned to his disciples, and said secretly, \*Blessed are the eyes, which see that ye see.

24 For I tell you that many Prophets and Kings have desired to see those things, which ye see, and have not seen *them:* and to hear those things, which ye hear, and have not heard *them*.

25  $\P$  \*Then behold, a certain expounder of the Law stood up, and tempted him, saying, Master, what shall I do, to inherit eternal life?

26 And he said unto him, What is written in the Law? how readest thou?

27 And he answered, and said, \*Thou shalt love thy Lord God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy thought, \*and thy neighbor as thy self.

31 And by <sup>s</sup>chance there came down a certain <sup>t</sup>Priest that same way, and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side.

32 And likewise also a Levite, when he was come near to the place, went and looked *on him*, and passed by on the other side. 33 Then a certain "Samaritan, as he journeyed, came near unto him, and when he saw him, he had compassion on him,

34 And went to him, and bound up his wounds, and poured in oil and wine, and put him on his own beast, and brought him to an ynne, and made provision for him.

35 And on the morowe when he departed, he took out \*two pence, and gave them to the host, and said unto him, Take care of him, and whatsoever thou spendest more, when I come again, I will recompense thee.

36 Which now of these three, thinkest thou, was neighbor unto him that fell among the thieves?

37 And he said, He that shewed mercy on him. Then said Jesus unto him, Go, <sup>y</sup>and do thou likewise.

 $38 \ \mbox{\P}$  Now it came to pass as they went, that he entered into a certain town, and a certain woman named Martha, received him into her house.

39 And she had a sister called Marie, which also sate at Jesus' feet, and heard his preaching.

40 But Martha was combred about much serving, and came to him, and said, Master, doest thou not care that my sister hath left me to serve alone? bid her therefore, that she help me.

41 And Jesus answered, and said unto her, Martha, Martha, thou carest, and art <sup>z</sup>troubled about many things.

# Chapter 11

2 He teacheth his disciples to pray. 14 He driveth out a devil, 15 And rebuketh the blasphemous Pharises. 28 He preferreth the spiritual cousinage 29 They require signs and tokens. 37 He eateth with the Pharise, and reproveth the hypocrisy of the Pharises, Scribes, and hypocrites.

And so it was, that as he was praying in a certain place, when he ceased, one of his disciples said unto him, Master, teach us to pray, as John also taught his disciples.

2 \*And he said unto them, When ye pray, say, Our Father, which art in heaven, halowed by thy Name: Thy kingdom come: Let thy will be done even in earth, as *it is* in heaven:

3 Our daily bread give us afor the day:

4 And ^forgive us our sins: for even we forgive every man that is indetted to us: And lead us not into temptation: but deliver us from evil.

5 ¶ Moreover he said unto them,  ${}^{b}$ Which of you shall have a friend, and shall go to him at midnight, and say unto him, Friend, lend me three loaves?

6 For a friend of mine is come ^out of the way to me, and I have nothing to set before him:

7 And he within should answer, and say, Trouble me not: the door is now shut, and my children are with me in bed: I can not rise and give them to thee.

8 I say unto you, though he would not arise and give him, because he is his friend, yet doubtless because of his ^importunity, he would rise, & give him as many as he needed. 9 \*And I say unto you, Ask, and it shalbe given you: seek, and ye shall find: knock, and it shalbe opened unto you.

10 For every one that asketh, receiveth: and he that seeketh, findeth: and to him that knocketh, it shalbe opened.

11 \*If a son shall ask bread of any of you that is a father, will he give him a stone? or if *he ask* a fish, will he for a fish give him a serpent?

12 Or if he ask an egg, will he give him a scorpion?

13 If ye then which are evil, can give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your heavenly Father give °the holie Ghost to them, that desire him?

14 ¶ \*Then he cast out a devil which was domme: and when the devil was gone out, the domme spake, and the people wondered. 15 \*But some of them said, He casteth out devils through Beel-zebub the chief of the devils.

16 And others tempted him, seeking of him a sign from heaven. 17 But he knewe their thoughts, and said unto them, \*Every kingdom divided against it self, shalbe desolate, and an house *divided* against an house, falleth.

18 So if Satan also be divided against him self, how shall his

kingdom stand, because ye say that I cast out devils through Beelzebub?

19 If I through Beelzebub cast out devils, by whom do your <sup>d</sup>children cast them out? Therefore shall they be your judges.

20 But if I by the °finger of God cast out devils, doubtless the kingdom of God is come unto you.

21 When a strong man armed, kepeth his palace, the things that he possesseth, are in ^peace.

22 But when a stronger then he, commeth upon him, and overcometh him: he taketh from him all his armour wherein he trusted, and devideth his spoils.

23 He that is not <sup>9</sup> with me, is against me: and he that gathereth not with me, scattereth.

24 \*When the unclean spirit is gone out of a man, he walketh through dry places, seeking <sup>h</sup>rest and when he findeth none, he saith, I will return unto mine house whence I came out.

25 And when he commeth, he findeth it swept and <sup>i</sup>garnished.

26 Then <sup>k</sup>goeth he, and taketh to him <sup>k</sup>seven other spirits worse then him self: and they enter in, and dwell there, \*so the last state of that man is worse then the first.

27 ¶ And it came to pass as he said these things, a certain woman of the company lifted up her voice, and said unto him, Blessed is the womb that bare thee, and the pappes which thou hast sucked.

28 But he said, "Yea, rather blessed are they that hear the word of God, and keep it.

29 ¶ \*And when the people were gathered thick together, he began to say, This is a wicked generation: they seek a sign, & there shall no sign be given them, but the sign of \*Jonas the Prophet. 30 For as Jonas was a sign to the Ninevites, so shall also the Son of man be to this generation.

31 \*The Queen of the South shall rise in judgement, with the men of this generation, and shall condemn them: for she came from the utmost parts of the earth to hear the wisdom of Solomon, and behold, a greater then Solomon is here.

32 The men of Nineve shall rise in judgement with this generation, and shall condemn it: for they \*repented at the preaching of Jonas: and behold, a greater then Jonas *is* here.

33 ¶ \*No man lighteth a candel, and putteth it in a privie place, neither under a bushel: but on a candlestick, that they which come in, may see the light.

34 \*^The light of the body is the "eye: therefore when thine eye

36 If therefore thy whole body shalbe light, having no part dark, then shall all be light, even as when a candel doeth light thee with the brightness.

37 ¶ And as he spake, a certain Pharise besought him to dyne with him: and he went in, and sate down at table.

38 And when the Pharise saw it: he marveiled that he had not first washed before dyner.

39 \*And the Lord said to him, In deed ye Pharises make clean the outside of the cup, and of the platter: but the inward part is full of ravening and wickedness.

40 Ye fools, did not he that made that which is without, make that which is within also?

41 Therefore, <sup>p</sup>give alms of ^those things which are within, and behold, all things shalbe clean to you.

42 But wo be to you, Pharises: for ye tithe the mynt and the rewe, and all manner herbs, and pass over Ajudgement and the love of God: these ought ye to have done, and <sup>q</sup>not to have left the other undone.

43 \*Wo be to you, Pharises: for ye love the uppermost seats in the Synagogues, and greetings in the markets.

44 Wo be to you, Scribes and Pharises, hypocrites: for ye are as graves which 'appear not, and the men that walk over them, perceive not.

45 ¶ Then answered one of the expounders of the Law, and said unto him, Master, thus saying thou puttest us to rebuke also.

46 \*And he said, Wo be to you also, ye interpreters of the Law: for ye lade men with burdens grievous to be born, and ye your selves touch not the burdens with one of your fingers.

47 Wo be to you: for ye sbuild the sepulchers of the Prophets, and your fathers killed them.

48 'Truly ye bear witness, and allow the deeds of your fathers: for they killed them, and ye "build their sepulchers.

49 Therefore said the wisdom of God, I will send them Prophets and Apostles, and of them they shall slay and ^persecute,

50 That the blood of all the Prophets, shed from the foundation of the world, may be required of this generation,

51 From the blood of \*Abel unto the blood of \*Zacharias, which was slain between the altar and the Temple: verily I say unto you, it shalbe required of \*this generation.

52 Wo be to you, interpreters of the Law: for ye have ytaken away the key of knowledge: ye entered not in your selves, and them that came in, ye forbade.

n \*the mean time, there gathered together an innumerable multitude of people, so that they trod one another: and he began to say unto his disciples first, Take heed to your selves of the leaven of the Pharises, which is hypocrisy.

2 \*For there is nothing covered, that shall not be revealed: neither hid, that shall not be knowen.

3 Wherefore whatsoever ye have spoken in darkness, it shalbe heard in the light: and that which ye have spoken in the ear, in secret places, shalbe preached on the <sup>a</sup>houses.

4 \*And I say unto you, my friends, be not afraid of them that kill the body, and after that are not able to do any more.

5 But I will forewarn you, whom ye shall fear: fear him which after he hath killed, hath power to cast into hell: yea, I say unto you, him fear.

6 Are not five sparrows bought for two farthings, *and* yet not one of them is forgotten before God?

7 Yea, and all the hairs of your head are numbered: fear not therefore: ye are more of value then many sparrows.

8 \*Also I say unto you, Whosoever shall confess me before men, him shall the Son of man confess also before the Angels of God. 9 But he that shall deny me before men, shalbe denied before the Angels of God.

10 And whosoever shall speak a word against the Son of man, it shalbe forgiven him: but unto him that <sup>b</sup>shall blaspheme the holie Ghost, it shall not be forgiven.

11 \*And when they shall bring you unto the Synagogues, and unto the rulers and princes, take no <sup>°</sup>thought how, or what thing ye shall answer, or what ye shall speak.

12 For the holie Ghost shall teach you in that same ^hour, what ye ought to say.

13 And one of the company said unto him, Master, bid my brother divide the inheritance with me.

14 And he said unto him, Man, who made me a <sup>d</sup>judge, or a divider over you?

15 Wherefore he said unto them, Take heed, and beware of covetousness: <sup>e</sup>for though a man have abundance, *yet* his life standeth not in his riches.

20 But God said unto him, O fool, this night will they fetch away thy soul from thee: then whose shall those things be which thou hast provided?

21 So *is* he that gathereth riches to him self, & is not rich in <sup>f</sup>God. 22 And he spake unto his disciples, Therefore I say unto you, \*Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat: neither for your body, what ye shall put on.

23 The life is more then meat: & the body *more* then the raiment. 24 <sup>g</sup>Consider the ravens: for they neither sow nor reap: which neither have store house nor barn, and *yet* God fedeth them: how much more are ye better then fowls?

25 And which of you with taking thought, can add to his stature one cubit?

26 If ye then be not able to do the least thing, why take ye thought for the remnant?

27 <sup>h</sup>Consider the lilies how they grow: they labor not, neither spin they: yet I say unto you, that Solomon him self in all his royalty was not clothed like one of these.

28 If then God so cloth the grass which is to day in the field, and to morrow is cast into the oven, how much more *will he cloth* you, ô ye of little faith?

29 Therefore ask not what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink, neither ^stand in doubt.

30 For all such things the people of the world seek for: and your Father knoweth that ye have need of these things.

31 But rather seek ye after the kingdom of God, and all these things shalbe ministered unto you.

32 Fear not, little flock: for it is you Father's pleasure, to give you the <sup>k</sup>kingdom.

33 ¶ \*Sell that ye have, and give alms: make you bags, which wax not old, a treasure that can never fail in heaven, where no thief commeth, neither moth corrupteth.

34 For where your treasure is, there will your hearts be also.

35 ¶ \*Let your loins be <sup>1</sup>gird about, and your lights burning,

36 And ye your selves like unto men that wait for their master, when he will return from the wedding, that when he commeth and knocketh, they may open unto him immediately.

37 Blessed *are* those servants, whom the Lord when he cometh shall find waking: verily I say unto you, he will "gird him self about, and make them to sit down at table, and will come forth, and serve them.

38 And if he come in the second watch, or come in the third

watch, and shall find them so, blessed are those servants.

39 \*Now understand this, that if the good man of the house had knowen at what hour the thief would have come, he would have watched, and would not have suffered his house to be digged through.

40 Be ye also prepared therefore: for the Son of man will come at an hour when ye think not.

41 Then Peter said unto him, Master, tellest thou this parable unto us, or even to all?

42 And the Lord said, Who is a faithful steward, and wise, whom the master shall make ruler over his household, to give them their "portion of meat in season?

43 Blessed *is* that servant, whom his master when he cometh, shall find so doing.

44 Of a truth I say unto you, that he will make him ruler over all that he hath.

45 But if that servant say in his heart, My master doeth defer his coming, and shall begin to smite the servants, and maidens, and to eat, and drink, and to be drunken,

46 The master of that servant will come in a day when he thinketh not, and at an hour when he is not ware of, and will cut him off, and give him his portion with the unbelievers.

47 ¶ And that servant that knewe his master's will, and prepared not him self, neither did according to his will, shalbe beaten with many *stripes*.

48 But he that knewe it not, and yet did commit things °worthy of stripes, shalbe beaten with few *stripes*: for unto whom soever <sup>p</sup>much is given, of him shalbe much required, and to whom men much commit, the more of him will they ask.

49 ¶ I am come to put <sup>a</sup>fire on the earth, and what is my desire, if it be all 'ready kindled?

50 Notwithstanding I must be <sup>s</sup>baptised with a baptism, and how am I grieved, till it be ended?

51 \*Think ye that I am come to give peace on earth? I tell you, nay, but rather debate.

52 For from hence forth there shalbe five in one house divided, three against two, and two against three.

53 The father shalbe divided against the son, & the son against the father: the mother against the daughter, and the daughter against the mother: the mother in law against her daughter in law, and the daughter in law, against her mother in law.

54 ¶ \*Then said he to the people, When ye see a cloud rise out of the West, straight way ye say, A shower cometh: and so it is. 55 And when *ye see* the South wind blow, ye say, that it will be hot: and it commeth to pass.

56 Hypocrites, ye can discern the face of the earth, and of the sky: but why discern ye not this time?

57 Yea, and why judge ye not of your selves what is right?

58 ¶ \*While thou goest with thine adversary to the ruler, as thou art in the way, give diligence in the way, that thou maist be delivered from him, lest he bring thee to the judge, and the judge deliver thee to the jayler, and the jayler cast thee into prison.

59 I tell thee, thou shalt not depart thence, till thou hast payed

the utmost mite.

## Chapter 13

1 The crueltie of Pilate. 2 We ought not to condemn all to be wicked men which suffer. 3 Christ exhorteth to repentance. 11 He healeth the croked woman, 15 Answereth to the master of the Synagogue 18 By divers similitudes he declareth what the kingdom of God is, 23 Also that the number of them which shall be saved, is small. 33 Finally he sheweth that no worldly policy or force can let the work and counsel of God.

There were certain men present at the same season, that shewed him of the Galileans, whose blood Pilate had amingled with their own sacrifices.

2 And Jesus answered, and said unto them, Suppose ye, that these Galileans were <sup>b</sup>greater sinners then all the *other* Galileans, because they have suffered such things?

3 I tell you, nay: but except <sup>c</sup>ye amend your lives, ye shall all likewise perish.

4 Or think you that those eighteen, upon whom the tower in <sup>d</sup>Siloam fell, and slew them, were <sup>^</sup>sinners above all men that dwell in Jerusalem?

5 I tell you, nay: but except ye amend your lives, ye all shall likewise perish.

 $6~\P$  He spake also this parable, A certain man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard: and he came and sought fruit thereon, and found none.

7 Then said he to the dresser of his vineyard, Behold, <sup>e</sup>this three years have I come and sought fruit of this fig tree, and find none: <sup>f</sup>cut it down: why kepeth it <sup>g</sup>also the ground barren?

8 And he answered, and said unto him, Lord, let it alone this year also, till I dig round about it, and dongue it.

9 And if it bear fruit, *well*: if not, then after thou shalt cut it down. 10  $\P$  And he taught in one of the Synagogues on the Sabbath

day. 11 And behold, there was a woman which had a <sup>h</sup>spirit of infirmity eighteen years, and was <sup>i</sup>bowed together, and could not lift up her self in any wise.

12 When Jesus saw her, he called her to him, and said to her, Woman, thou art Alosed from thy disease.

13 And he laid his hands on her, and immediately she was made straight again, and glorified God.

14 And the ruler of the Synagogue answered with indignation because that Jesus had healed on the Sabbath *day*, & said unto the people, There are six days in which men ought to work: in them therefore come and be healed, & not on the Sabbath day. 15 Then answered him the Lord, and said, Hypocrite, doeth not each one of you on the Sabbath *day* lose his ox or his ass from the stall, and lead him away to the water?

16 And ought not this daughter of Abraham, whom Satan had

17 And when he said these things, all his adversaries were ashamed: but all the people rejoiced at all the excellent things, that were done by him.

18 ¶ \*Then said he, What is the kingdom of God like? or where-to shall I compare it?

19 It is like a grain of mustard seed, which a man took and sowed in his garden, and it grew, and waxed a great tree, and the fowls of the heaven made nests in the branches thereof.

1 Jesus eateth with the Pharise. 4 Healeth the dropsy upon the Sabbath 8 Teacheth to be lowlie and to bid the poor to our table. 15 He telleth of the great supper. 28 He warneth them that will follow him, to lay their accounts before, what it will cost them. 34 The salt of the earth.

And it came to pass that when he was entered into the house of one of the chief Pharises on the Sabbath *day*, to ^eat bread, they watched him.

2 And behold, there was a certain man before him, which had the dropsy.

3 Then Jesus answering, spake unto the expounders of the Law, and Pharises, saying, Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath *day*?

4 And they held their peace. Then he took him, and healed him, and let him go,

5 And answered them, saying, Which of you *shall have* an ass, or an ox fallen into a pit, and will not straightway pull him out on the Sabbath day?

6 And they could not answer him again to those things.

7 ¶ He spake also a parable to the ghests, when he marked how they chose out the chief rooms, and said unto them,

8 <sup>a</sup>When thou shalt be bidden of any man to a wedding, set not thy self down in the chiefest place, lest a more honorable man then thou, be bidden of him,

9 And he that bade both him and thee, come, and say to thee, Give this man room, and thou then begin with shame to take the lowest room.

10 \*But when thou art bidden, go and sit down in the lowest room, that when he that bade thee, cometh, he may say unto thee, Friend, sit up higher: then shalt thou have worship in the presence of them that sit at table with thee.

11 \*For whosoever exalteth him self, shalbe brought low, and he that humbleth him self, shalbe exalted.

12 ¶ Then <sup>b</sup>said he also to him that had bidden him, \*When thou makest a dyner or a supper, call not thy friends, nor thy brethren, neither thy kinsemen, nor the rich neighbors, lest they also bid thee again, and a recompense be made thee.

13 But when thou makest a feast, call the poor, the maimed, the lame, and the blind,

14 And thou shalt be blessed, because they can not recompense thee: for thou shalt be recompensed at the resurrection of the just.

15 ¶ Now when one of them that sat at table, heard these things, he said unto him, Blessed *is* he that eateth bread in the kingdom of God.

# Chapter 15

2 The Pharises murmur because Christ receiveth sinners 4 The loving mercy of God is openly set forth in the parable of the hundreth sheep, 7 Joy in heaven for one sinner. 12 Of the prodigal son.

Then resorted unto him all the Publicans, and sinners, to hear him. 2 Therefore the Pharises and scribes murmured, saying, He receiveth sinners, and eateth with them.

3 Then spake he this parable to them, saying,

4 \*What man of you having an hundreth sheep, if he loose one of them, doeth not leave the ninetie and nine in the wilderness, and go after that which is lost, until he find it?

5 And when he hath found it, he laieth it on his shoulders with joy.

6 And when he cometh home, he calleth together his friends and neighbors, saying unto them, Rejoice with me: for I have found my sheep, which was lost.

7 I say unto you, that likewise joy shalbe in heaven for one sinner that converteth, *more* then for ninetie and nine <sup>a</sup>just men, which need none amendment of life.

8 Either what woman having ten <sup>b</sup>pieces of silver, if she loose one piece, doeth not light a candle, and sweep the house, and seek diligently till she find it?

9 And when she hath found it, she calleth her friends, and neighbors, saying, Rejoice with me: for I have found the piece which I had lost.

10 Likewise I say unto you, there is joy in the presence of the Angels of God, for one sinner that converteth.

11 ¶ He said moreover, A certain man had two sons.

12 And the younger of them said to his father, Father, give me the <sup>°</sup>portion of the goods that falleth to me. So he divided unto them *his* substance.

13 So not long after, when the younger son had gathered all together, he took his journey into a far country, and there he wasted his goods with <sup>d</sup>riotous living.

14 Now when he had spent all, there arose a great dearth throughout that land, and he began to be in necessity.

15 Then he went and clave to a citizen of that country, and he sent him to his farm, to feed swine.

16 And he would fain have filled his bellie with the husks, that the swine ate: <sup>e</sup>but no man gave *them* him.

17 Then he came to him self, and said, How many hired servants at my father's have bread enough, and I dye for hunger?

18 I will rise and go to my father, and say unto him, Father, I have sinned against heaven, and before thee,

19 And am no more worthy to be called thy son: make me as one of thy hired servants.

20 So he arose and came to his father, and when he was yet a <sup>g</sup>great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran and fell on his neck, and kissed him.

21 And the son said unto him, <sup>h</sup>Father, I have sinned against heaven, & before thee, and am no more worthy to be called thy son.

21 h He was touched with the feeling of his sin and therefore was ashamed thereof, and heavy in heart.

25 Now the Elder brother was in the field, and when he came and drew near to the house, he heard melodie, and dancing,

26 And called one of his servants, and asked what those things ment.

27 And he said unto him, Thy brother is come, & thy father hath killed the fatted calf, because he hath received him safe & sound. 28 Then he was angry, and would not go in: therefore came his father out and entreated him.

29 But he answered and said to his father, Lo these many years have I done thee service, neither brake I at any time thy commandment, and yet thou never gavest me a kid that I might make merry with my friends.

30 But when this thy son was come, which hath devoured thy goods with harlots, thou hast for his sake killed the fat calf.

31 And he said unto him, <sup>k</sup>Son, thou art ever with me, and all that I have, is thine. It was mete that we should make merry, and be glad: for this thy brother was dead, and is alive again: and he was lost, but he is found.

#### Chapter 16

1 Christ exhorteth his to wisdom and liberality by the example of the steward 13 None can serve two masters 14 He reproveth the covetousness and hypocrisy of the Pharises 16 Of the end and force of the Law. 18 Of the holie state of marriage. 19 Of the rich and Lazarus.

And he said also unto his disciples, "There was a certain rich man, which had a steward, and he was accused unto him, that he wasted his goods.

2 And he called him, and said unto him, How *is it* that I hear this of thee? Give an accounts of thy stewardship: for thou maist be no longer steward.

3 Then the steward said within him self, What shall I do: for my master will take away from me the stewardship? I can not dig, *and* to beg I am ashamed.

4 I know what I will do, that when I am put out of the stewardship they may receive me into their houses.

5 Then called he every one of his master's detters, and said unto the first, How much owest thou unto my master?

6 And he said, An hundreth measures of oil. And he said to him, Take thy writing, and sit down quickly, and write fifty.

7 Then said he to another, How much owest thou? And he said, An hundreth measures of wheat. Then he said to him, Take thy writing, and write four score.

8 And the Lord commended <sup>b</sup>the unjust steward, because he had done wisely. Wherefore the children of this world are in their generation wiser then the children of light.

#### Chapter 16

9 And I say unto you, Make you friends <sup>c</sup>with the riches of iniquity, that when ye shall want, they may receive you into everlasting habitations.

10 He that is faithful in the least, he is also faithful in much: and he that is unjust in the least, is unjust also in much.

11 If then ye have not been faithful in <sup>d</sup>the wicked riches, who will trust you in the true *treasure*?

12 And if ye have not been faithful in <sup>e</sup>another man's *goods*, who shall give you that which is <sup>f</sup>yours?

13 \*No servant can serve two masters: for either he shall hate the one, and love the other: or els he shall lean to the one, and despise the other. Ye can not serve God and riches.

14 All these things heard the Pharises also which were covetous, and they  ${}^{\rm g}$  mocked him.

15 Then he said unto them, Ye are they, which <sup>h</sup>justify your selves before men: but God knoweth your hearts: for that which is highly esteemed among men, is abomination in the sight of God.

16 \*The Law and the Prophets *endured* until John: and since that time the kingdom of God is preached, and every man <sup>i</sup>preasseth into it.

17 \*Now it is more easy that heaven and earth should pass away, then that one title of the Law should fall.

18 ¶ \*Whosoever putteth away his wife, and marieth another, committeth adulterie: and whosoever marieth her that <sup>k</sup>is put away from her husband, committeth adultery.

19  $\P$  There was a <sup>1</sup>certain rich man, which was clothed in purple and fine linen, and fared well and delicately every day.

20 Also there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, which was layed at his gate full of sores,

21 And desired to be refreshed with the crumbs that fell from the rich man's table: yea, and the dogs came and licked his sores. 22 And it was so that the beggar died, and was carried by the Angels into "Abraham's "bosom. The rich man also died and was buried.

23 And being in hell in torments, he lift up his eyes, and saw Abraham a far off, and Lazarus in his bosom.

24 Then he cried, and said, Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus that he may dip the tip of his °finger in water,

26 Besides all this, between you and us there is a great ^gulf set, so that they which would go from hence to you, can not, neither can they come from thence to us.

27 Then he said, I pray thee therefore father, that thou woldest send him to my father's house,

28 (For I have five brethren) that he may testify unto them, lest they also come into this place of torment.

29 Abraham said unto him, They have Moses and the <sup>q</sup>Prophets: let them 'hear them.

30 And he said, Nay, father Abraham: but if one came unto them from the dead, they will amend their lives.

31 Then he said unto him, If they hear not Moses and the Prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rise from the dead again.

## Chapter 17

2 Christ teacheth his disciples to avoid occasions of offence, 3 One to forgive another 5 We ought to pray for the increase of faith. 6 He magnifieth the Virtue of faith, 10 And sheweth the unhabilitie of man, 11 Healeth ten lepers, 20 Speaketh of the latter days, and of the end of the world.

Then said he to the disciples, \*It can not be avoided, but that offences will come, but wo be to him by whom they come.

2 It were better for him that a great millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were cast into the sea, then that he should <sup>a</sup>offend one of these little ones.

3 ¶ Take heed to your selves: if thy brother trespass against thee, rebuke him: and if he repent, forgive him.

4 \*And though he sin against thee <sup>b</sup>seven times in a day, and seven times in a day turn again to thee, saying, It repenteth me, thou shalt forgive him.

5 ¶ And the Apostles said unto the Lord, Increase our faith.

6 And the Lord said, \*If ye had faith as much as is <sup>c</sup>a grain of mustard seed, and should say unto this mulberry tree, <sup>d</sup>pluck thy self up by the roots, and plant thy self in the sea, it should even obey you.

7 ¶ Who is it also of you that having a servant plowing or feeding cattle, would say unto him by and by, when he were come from the field, Go, and sit down at table?

8 And would not rather say to him, <sup>e</sup>Dress wherewith I may sup, and gird thy self, and serve me, till I have eaten and drunken, and afterward eat thou, and drink thou?

29 r As faith comes by God's word, so is it maintained by the same. So that neither we ought to look for Angels from heaven, or the dead to confirm us therein, but only the word of God is sufficient to life everlasting. Chapter 17

9 Doeth he thank that servant, because he did that which was commanded unto him? I trowe not.

10 So likewise ye, when ye have done all those things, which are commanded you, say, We are <sup>f</sup>unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do.

11 ¶ And so it was when he went to Jerusalem, that he passed through the middes of Samaria and Galile.

12 And as he entered into a certain town, there met him ten men that were lepers, which stood a far off.

13 And they lift up their voices and said, Jesus, Master, have mercy on us.

14 And when he saw *them*, he said unto them, \*Go, shewe your selves unto the <sup>9</sup>Priests. And it came to pass, that as they went, they were cleansed.

15 Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, and with a loud voice praised God,

16 And fell down on his face at his feet, and gave him thanks: and he was a Samaritan.

17 And Jesus answered, and said, Are there not ten cleansed? but where *are* the hnine?

18 There are none found that returned to give God praise, save this stranger.

19 And he said unto him, Arise, go thy way, thy faith hath made thee whole.

20 ¶ And when he was demanded of the Pharises, when the kingdom of God should come, he answered them, and said, The kingdom of God cometh not <sup>i</sup>with observation.

21 Neither shall men say, Lo here, or lo there: for behold the kingdom of God is  $^{k}$  within you.

22 And he said unto the disciples, The days will come, when ye shall desire to see <sup>l</sup>one of the days of the Son of man, and ye shall not see it.

23 \*Then they shall say to you, Behold here, or behold there: *but* go not thither, neither follow them.

24 For as the lightening that lighteneth out of the one *part* under heaven, shineth unto the other *part* under heaven, so shall the Son of man be in his <sup>m</sup>day.

25 But first must he suffer many things, and be reproved of this generation.

26 \*And as it was in the "days of Noe, so shall it be in the days of the Son of man.

27 They ate, they drank, they married wives, and gave in marriage unto the day that Noe went into the Arke: and the flood came, and destroyed them all.

28 Likewise also, as it was in the days of Lot: they ate, they drank, they bought, they sold, they planted, they built.

29 \*But in the day that Lot went out of Sodom, it rained fire and brimstone from heaven, and destroyed them all.

And \*he spake also a parable unto them, *to this end*, that they ought always to pray, and not to <sup>a</sup>wax faint, 2 Saying, There was a judge in a certain city, which feared not God, neither reverenced man.

3 And there was a widow in that city, which came unto him, saying, ^Do me justice against mine <sup>b</sup>adversary.

4 And he would no for a time: but afterward he said with him self, Though I fear not God, nor reverence man,

5 Yet because this widow troubleth me, I will do her right, lest at the last she come and make me weary.

6 And the Lord said, Hear what the unrighteous judge saith.

7 Now shall not God avenge his elect, which cry day and night unto him, yea, though <sup>c</sup>he suffer long for them?

8 I tell you he will advenge them quickly: but when the Son of man cometh, shall he find faith on the earth?

9 ¶ He spake also this parable unto certain which trusted in them selves that they were just, and despised other,

10 Two men went up into the Temple to pray: the one a Pharise, and the other a Publican.

11 The Pharise <sup>d</sup>stood and prayed thus with him self, O God, I thank thee that I am not as other men, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this Publican.

12 I fast twice in the week: I give tithe of all that ever I possess. 13 But the Publican standing a far off, would not lift up so much as his <sup>e</sup>eyes to heaven, but smote his breast, saying, O God, be merciful to me a sinner.

31 o We must forget that which we have left behind us, to the end, that we may the better follow the heavenly vocation.

34 q He means that no band or conjunction is so strait that should stay us. 35 5 Two shalbe in the field: one shalbe received, & another shalbe left. 36 \*Mt. 24.28.

Chapter 18

15  $\P$  \*They brought unto him also <sup>f</sup>babes, that he should touch them. And when his disciples saw it, they rebuked them.

16 But Jesus called <sup>9</sup>them unto him and said, Suffer the babes to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of <sup>h</sup>such is the kingdom of God.

17 Verily I say unto you, whosoever receiveth not the kingdom of God as <sup>i</sup>a babe, he shall not enter therein.

18 \*Then a certain ruler asked him, saying, Good master, what ought I to do, to inherit etemal life?

19 And Jesus said unto him, Why callest thou me \*good? none is good, save one, *even* God.

20 Thou knowest the commandments, \*Thou shalt not commit adultery: Thou shalt not kill: Thou shalt not steal: Thou shalt not beare false witness: Honor thy father and thy mother.

21 And he said, All these have I kept from my youth.

22 Now when Jesus heard that, he said unto him, Yet lackest thou one thing. Sell all that ever thou hast, and distribute unto the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven, & come, follow me. 23 But when he heard those things, he was very heavy: for he was marvelous rich.

24 And when Jesus saw him sorrowful, he said, With what difficulty shall they that have riches, enter into the kingdom of God? 25 Surely it is easier for a ^camel to go through a needle's eye, then for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God.

26 Then said they that heard it, And who then can be saved?

27 And he said, The things which are unpossible with men, are possible with God.

28 ¶ \*Then Peter said, Lo, we have left all, & have followed thee. 29 And he said unto them, Verily I say unto you, there is no man that hath left house, or parents, or brethren, or wife, or children for the kingdom of God's sake,

30 Which shall not receive "much more in this world, and in the world to come life everlasting.

31  $\P$  \*Then Jesus took unto him the twelve, and said unto them, Behold, we go up to Jerusalem, and all things shalbe fulfilled to the Son of man, that are written by the Prophets.

32 For he shalbe delivered unto the Gentiles and shalbe mocked, and shalbe spitefully entreated, and shalbe spitted on. 33 And when they have scourged him, they will put him to death: but the third day he shall rise again.

34 But they understood none of these things, and this saying was hid from them, neither perceived they the things, which were spoken.

#### Chapter 19

2 Of Zaccheus. 12 The ten pieces of money 28 Christ rideth to Jerusalem, and wepeth for it. 45 He chaseth out the merchants, 47 And his enemies seek to destroy him.

N when Jesus entered and passed through Jericho, 2 Behold, there was a man named Zaccheus, which *was* the chief receiver of the tribute, and he was rich.

3 And he sought to see Jesus, who he should be, and could not for the press, because he was of a low stature.

4 Wherefore he ran before, and climed up into a wild fig tree, that he might see him: for he should come that *way*.

5 And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up, and saw him, and said unto him, Zaccheus, come down at once: for to day I must abide at thine house.

6 Then he came down hastily, and received him joyfully.

7 And when all they saw it, they murmured, saying, that he was gone in to lodge with a ^sinful man.

8 And Zaccheus stood forth, and said unto the Lord, Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor: and if I have taken from any man by ^forged cavillation, I restore him four fold.

9 Then Jesus said to him, This day is salvation come unto this <sup>a</sup>house, forasmuch as he is also become the <sup>b</sup>son of Abraham. 10 \*For the Son of man is come to seek, and to save that which was lost.

11 And whiles they heard these things, he continued and spake a parable, because he was near to Jerusalem, and because also they thought that the kingdom of God should shortly appear.

12 He said therefore, \*A certain noble man went into °a far country, to receive for him self a kingdom, and so to come again.

#### Chapter 19

7 ^Or, a man of a wicked life.

13 And he called his ten servants, and delivered them ten  $^{\rm d}{\rm pieces}$  of money, and said unto them,  $^{\rm e}{\rm Occupy}$  till I come.

14 Now his citizens hated him, and sent an ambassage after him, saying, We will not have this man to reign over us.

15 And it came to pass, when he was come <sup>f</sup>again, and had received his kingdom, that he commanded the servants to be called to him, to whom he gave his money, that he might know what every man had gained.

16 Then came the first, saying, Lord, thy piece hath increased ten pieces.

17 And he said unto him, Well, good servant: because thou hast been faithful in a very little thing, take thou authority over ten cities.

18 And the second came, saying, Lord, thy piece hath increased five pieces.

19 And to the same he said, Be thou also *ruler* over five cities. 20 So the other came and said, Lord, behold thy piece, which I have laid up in a napkin.

21 For I feared thee, because thou art a strait man: thou takest up, that thou laidest not down, and reapest that thou didest not sow.

22 Then he said unto him, Of thine own <sup>g</sup>mouth will I judge thee, ô evil servant. Thou knewest that I am a strait man, taking up that I laid not down, and reaping that I did not sow.

23 Wherefore then gavest not thou my money into the bank, that at my coming I might have required it with vantage?

24 And he said to them that stood by, Take from him that piece, and give it him that hath ten pieces.

25 (And they said unto him, Lord, he hath ten pieces.)

26 \*For I say unto you, that unto all them that have, it shalbe <sup>h</sup>given: and from him that hath not, even that he hath, shalbe taken from him.

27 More those mine enemies, which would not that I should reign over them, bring hither, and slay them before me.

28 ¶ And when he had thus spoken, he went forth before, ascending up to Jerusalem.

29 \*And it came to pass, when he was come near to Bethphage, and Bethania, besides the mount which is called *the mount* of olives, he sent two of his disciples,

30 Saying, Go ye to the town which is before *you*, wherein, assone as ye are come, ye shall find a colt tied, whereon never man sate: lose him, and bring him *hither*.

31 <sup>k</sup>And if any man ask you, why ye lose *him*, thus shall ye say unto him, Because the Lord hath need of him.

32 So they that were sent, went their way, and found it as he had said unto them.

33 And as they were losing the colt, the owners thereof said unto them, Why lose ye the colt?

34 And they said, The Lord hath need of him.

35 ¶\*So they brought him to Jesus, and they cast their garments

on the colt, and set Jesus thereon.

36 And as he went, they spread their clothes in the way.

37 And when he was now come near to the going down of the mount of olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to rejoice, and to praise God with a loud voice, for all the great works that they had seen,

38 Saying, Blessed *be* the King that cometh in the Name of the Lord: <sup>1</sup>peace in heaven, and glory in the highest *places*.

39 Then some of the Pharises of the company said unto him, Master, rebuke thy disciples.

40 But he answered, and said unto them, I tell you, that if these should hold their peace, the stones would cry.

41 ¶ \*And when he was come near, he beheld the city, and wept for it,

42 Saying, "O if thou haddest even knowen at the least in this thy day "those things, which *belong* unto thy peace: but now are they °hid from thine eyes.

43 For the days shall come upon thee, that thine enemies shall cast a trench about thee, and compass thee round, and keep thee in on every side,

44 And shall make thee eaven with the ground, and thy children which are in thee, and they shall not leave in thee a stone upon a stone, because thou knewest not the time of thy <sup>p</sup>visitation.

45  $\P$  \*He went also into the Temple, and began to cast out them that sold therein, and them that bought,

46 Saying unto them, It is written, \*Mine house is the house of prayer, \*but ye have made it a den of thieves.

47 And he taught Adaily in the Temple. And the high Priests and the Scribes, and the chief of the people sought to destroy him.

48 But they could not find what they might do to him: for all the people <sup>q</sup>hanged upon him when they heard him.

## Chapter 20

4 Christ stoppeth his adversaries mouthes by another question. 9 Sheweth their destruction by a parable 22 The authority of princes. 27 The resurrection, and his divine power. 45 He reproveth the ambition of the Scribes.

And \*it came to pass that on one of those days, as he taught the people in the Temple, and preached the Gospel, the high Priests and the Scribes came upon him with the Elders,

2 And spake unto him, saying, Tell us by what authority thou doest these things, or who is he that hath given thee this authority? 3 And he answered and said unto them, I also will ask you one thing: tell me therefore:

4 The abaptism of John was it from heaven, or of men?

5 And they reasoned within them selves, saying, If we shall say from heaven, he will say, Why then believed ye him not?

4 a By baptism he comprehends all John's ministry, who bare witness to Christ.

6 But if we shall say, Of men, all the people will stone us: for they be persuaded that John was a Prophet.

7 Therefore they answered, that they could not tell whence it was.

8 Then Jesus said unto them, <sup>b</sup>Neither tell I you, by what authority I do these things.

9 ¶ \*Then began he to speak to the people this parable, \*A certain man planted a °vineyard, and d let it forth to husband men: and went into a strange country, for a great season.

10 And at a time he sent a <sup>e</sup>servant to the husband men, that they should give him of the fruit of the vineyard, but the husband men did beat him, and sent him a way empty.

11 Again he sent yet another servant: and they did beat him, and fowle entreated him, and sent him away empty.

12 Moreover, he sent the third, & him they wounded, & cast out. 13 Then said the Lord of the vineyard, What shall I do? I will send my beloved son: it may be that they will do reverence, when they see him.

14 But when the husband men saw him, they reasoned with them selves, saying, This is the heir: come, let us kill him, that the inheritance may be ours.

15 So they cast him out of the vineyard, and killed him. What shall the Lord of the vineyard therefore do unto them?

16 He will come and destroy these husband men, and will give out his vineyard to others. But when they heard it, they said, God forbid.

17  $\P$  And he beheld them, and said, What meaneth this then that is written, \*The stone that the builders refused, that is made the head <sup>f</sup>of the corner?

18 <sup>9</sup>Whosoever shall fall upon that stone, shalbe broken: and on whomsoever it shall fall, it will grind him to powder.

19 Then the high Priests and the Scribes the same hour went about to lay hands on him: (but they feared the people) for they perceived that he had spoken this parable against them.

20 \*And they <sup>h</sup>watched *him*, and sent forth spies, which should fain them selves just men, to take him in his talk, and to deliver him unto the power and authority of the governor.

21 And they asked him, saying, Master, we know that thou sayest, and teachest right, neither doest thou accept man's person, but teachest the way of God truly.

22 Is it lawful for us to give Cesar tribute or no?

23 But he perceived their craftiness, and said unto them, Why tempt ye me?

24 Shewe me a penie. Whose image and superscription hath it? They answered and said, Cesar's.

25 Then he said unto them, \*\*Give then unto Cesar the things which are Cesar's, and to God those which are God's.

26 And they could not reprove his saying before the people: but they marveled at his answer, and held their peace.

there is any resurrection) and they asked him,

28 Saying, Master, \*Moses wrote unto us, If any man's brother die having a wife, and he die without children, that his brother should take *his* wife, and raise up seed unto his brother.

29 Now there were seven brethren, and the first took a wife, and he died without children.

30 And the second took the wife, and he died childless.

31 Then the third took her: and so likewise the seven died, and left no children.

32 And last of all, the woman died also.

33 Therefore at the resurrection, whose wife of them shall she be? for seven had her to wife.

34 Then Jesus answered, and said unto them, The <sup>1</sup>children of this world marry wives and are married.

35 But they which shalbe counted worthy to enjoy that world, and the resurrection from the dead, neither marry wives, neither are married.

36 "For they can die no more, forasmuch as they are equal unto the Angels, and are the Sons of God, "since they are the children of the resurrection.

37 And that the dead shall rise again, even \*Moses shewed it besides the bush, when he said, The Lord *is* the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob.

38 For he is not the God of the °dead, but of them which live: °for all live unto him.

39 Then certain of the Pharises answered and said, Master, thou hast well said.

40 And after that, durst they not ask him any thing at all.

41  $\P$  \*Then said he unto them, How say they that Christ is David's son?

42 And David him self saith in the book of the Psalms, \*The Lord said unto my Lord, sit at my right hand,

43 Till I shall make thine enemies thy footstool.

44 Seeing Davie calleth him Lord, how is he then his ason?

45  $\P$  Then in the audience of all the people he said unto his disciples,

46 \*Beware of the Scribes, which desire to go in long robes, and love salutations in the markets, and the highest seats in the Synagogues, and the chief rooms at feasts:

47 Which devour widows' houses, even under a color of long praying: these shall receive greater damnation.

## Chapter 21

3 Christ commendeth the poor widow 6 He forewarneth of the destruction of Jerusalem. 8 Of false teachers. 9 Of the tokens and troubles to come. 27 Of the end of the world, 37 And of his daily exercise.

And \*as he beheld, he saw the rich men, which cast their gifts into the treasury, 2 And he saw also a certain poor widow, which cast in thither two mites.

3 And he said, Of a truth I say unto you, that this poor widow hath cast in more then they all.

4 <sup>a</sup>For they all have of their superfluity cast into the offerings of God: but she of her penury hath cast in all the living that she had. 5 \*Now as some spake of the Temple, how it was garnished with goodly stones and with ^consecrate things, he said,

6 Are these the things that ye look upon? the days will come wherein a stone shall not be left upon a stone, that shall not be thrown down.

7 Then they asked him, saying, Master, but when shall these things be? and what sign *shall* there *be* when these things shall come to pass?

8 \*And he said, <sup>b</sup>Take heed, that ye be not deceived: for many will come in my Name, saying, I am *Christ*, and the time draweth near: follow ye not them therefore.

9 And when ye hear of wars and seditions, be not afraid: for these things must first come, but the end followeth not by and by. 10 Then said he unto them, Nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom,

11 \*And great earthquakes shalbe in divers places, and hunger, and pestilence, and fearful things, and great signs shall there be from heaven.

12 But before all these, they shall lay their hands on you, and persecute *you*, delivering you up to the Synagogues, and into prisons, & bring you before Kings and rulers for my Name's sake. 13 And this shall turn to you, for a °testimonial.

14 \*Lay it up therefore in your hearts, that ye premeditate not, what ye shall answer.

15 For I will give you a mouth and wisdom, where against all your adversaries shall not be able to speak, nor <sup>d</sup>resist.

16 Yea, ye shalbe betrayed also of your parents, and of your brethren, and kinsmen, and friends, and *some* of you shall they put to death.

17 And ye shall be hated of all men for my Name's sake.

18 \*Yet there shall not one hair of your heads perish.

19 By your patience <sup>e</sup>posses your souls.

20  $\P$  \*And when ye see Jerusalem besieged with soldiers, then understand that the desolation thereof is near.

21 Then let them which are in Judea, flee to the mountains: and let them which are in the middes thereof, depart out: and let not them that are in the country, enter therein.

22 For these be the days of vengeance, to fulfill all things that are written.

23 But wo *be* to them that be with child, and to them that give suck in those days: for there shalbe great distress in this land, and <sup>f</sup>wrath over this people.

27 And then shall they see the Son of man come in a cloud, with power and great glory.

28 And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads: \*for your <sup>h</sup>redemption draweth near.

29 And he spake to them a parable, Behold, the fig tree, and all trees,

30 When they now shote forth, ye seeing them, know of your own selves, that summer is then near.

31 So likewise ye when ye see these things come to pass, know ye that the kingdom of God is near.

32 Verily I say unto you, This age shall not pass, till all *these* things be done.

33 Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away.

34 Take heed to your selves, lest at any time your hearts be oppressed with surfeiting and drunkenness, and cares of this life, and lest that day come on you at unawares.

35 For as a <sup>k</sup>snare shall it come on all them that dwell on the face of the whole earth.

36 Watch therefore, and pray continually, ^that ye may be counted worthy to escape all these things that shall come to pass, and that ye may stand before the Son of man.

37 ¶ Now in the day time he taught in the Temple, & at night he went out, & abode in the mount that is called *the mount* of olives. 38 And all the people came in the morning to him, to hear him in the Temple.

#### Chapter 22

N ow \*the <sup>a</sup>feast of unleavened bread drew near, which is called the Passover. 2 And the high Priests and Scribes sought how they might kill him: for they feared the people.

3 Then entered Satan into Judas, who was called Iscariot, and was of the number of the twelve.

4 And he went his way, and communed with the high Priests and <sup>b</sup>captains, how he might betray him to them.

Chapter 22

8 And he sent Peter and John, saying, Go, and prepare us the Passover, that we may eat it.

9 And they said to him, Where wilt thou, that we prepare it?

10 Then he said unto them, Behold, when ye be entered into the city, there shall a man met you, bearing a pitcher of water: follow him into the house that he entreth in,

11 And say unto the good man of the house, The Master saith unto thee, Where is the lodging where I shall eat my Passover with my disciples?

12 Then he shall shewe you a great high chamber trimmed: there make it ready.

13 So they went and found as he had said unto them, and made ready the Passsover.

14 \*And when the °hour was come, he sat down, and the twelve Apostles with him.

15 Then he said unto them, I have earnestly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer.

16 For I say unto you, 'Hence forth I will not eat of it any more, until it be fulfilled in the kingdom of God.

17 And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and said, Take this, and divide it among you.

18 For I say unto you, I will not drink of the fruit of the vine, until the kingdom of God be come.

19 \*And he took bread, and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and gave to them, saying, <sup>9</sup>This is my body, which is given for you: do this in the remembrance of me.

20 Likewise also after supper *he took* the cup, saying, This cup *is* the new <sup>h</sup>Testament in my blood, which is shed for you.

21 \*Yet behold, the hand of him that betrayeth me, is with me at the table.

22 And truly the Son of man goeth as it is \*iappointed: but wo be to that man, by whom he is betrayed.

23 Then they began to inquire among them selves which of them it should be, that should do that.

24  $\P$  \*And there arose also a strife among them, which of them should seem to be the greatest.

25 But he said unto them, The Kings of the Gentiles reign over them, & they that bear rule over them, are called <sup>k</sup>Gracious lords. 26 But ye *shall* not *be* so: but let the greatest among you be as the ^least: and the chiefest as he that serveth.

27 For who is greater, he that sitteth at table, or he that serveth? Is not he that sitteth at table? And I am among you as he that serveth.

28 And ye are they which have continued with me in my tentations.

29 Therefore I ^appoint unto you a kingdom, as my Father hath appointed to me,

30 \*That ye may leat, and drink at my table in my kingdom, and sit on seats, and judge the twelve tribes of Israel.

31 ¶ And the Lord said, Simon, Simon, behold, \*Satan hath desired you, "to winnow you, as wheat.

32 But I have prayed for thee, that thy faith "fail not: therefore when thou are converted, strengthen thy brethren.

33 \*And he said unto him, Lord, I am ready to go with thee into prison, and to death.

34 But he said, I tell thee, Peter, the cock shall not crow this day, before thou hast thrise denied that thou knewest me.

35 ¶ And he said unto them, \*When I sent you without bag, and scrip, and shoes, lacked ye any thing? And they said, Nothing.

36 Then he said to them, But now he that hath a bag, let him take it, and likewise a scrip: and he that hath none, let him sell his coat, and °buy a sword.

37 For I say unto you, That yet the same which is written, must be performed in me, \*Even with the wicked was he numbered: for doubtless those things which *are written* of me, have an end.

38 And they said, Lord, behold, here are <sup>P</sup>two swords. And he said unto them, It is enough.

43 And there appeared an Angel unto him from heaven, comforting him.

44 But being in an 'agony, he prayed more earnestly: and his sweat was like drops of blood, trickling down to the ground.

45 And he rose up from prayer, and came to *his* disciples, and found them sleeping for heaviness.

46 And he said unto them, Why sleep ye? rise and pray, lest ye enter into tentation.

47  $\P$  \*And while he yet spake, behold a company, and he that was called Judas one of the twelve, went before them, and came near unto Jesus to kiss him.

49 Now when they which were about him, saw what would follow, they said unto him, Lord, shall we smite with sword?

50 And one of them smote a servant of the high Priest, and strake off his right ear.

51 Then Jesus answered, and said, Suffer *them* thus far: and he touched his ear, and healed him.

52 Then Jesus said unto the high Priests, and captains of the Temple, and the Elders which were come to him, Be ye come out as unto a thief with swords and staves?

53 When I was daily with you in the Temple, ye stretched not forth the hands against me: but this is your very hour, and the <sup>s</sup>power of darkness.

54 ¶ Then took they him, and led him, and brought him to the high Priest's house. And Peter followed a far off.

55 \*And when they had kindled a fire in the middes of the hall, and were set down together, Peter also sat down among them. 56 And a certain maid beheld him as he sat down by the fire, and having well looked on him, said, This man was also with him.

57 But he denied him, saying, Woman, I know him not.

58 And after a little while, another man saw him, and said, Thou art also of them. But Peter said, Man, I am not.

59 And about the space of an hour after a certain other affirmed, saying, Verily even this man was with him: for he is also a Galilean.

60 And Peter said, Man, I know not what thou saiest. And immediately while he yet spake, the cock crewe.

61 Then the Lord turned back, and looked upon Peter: and Peter remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said unto him, \*Before the cock crow, thou shalt deny me thrise.

62 And Peter went out, and wept bitterly.

63 ¶ And the men that held Jesus, mocked him, and stroke him. 64 And when they had blindfolded him, they smote him on the face, and asked him, saying, 'Prophecy who it is that smote thee. 65 And many other things blasphemously spake they against him.

66 \*And assoon as it was day, the Elders of the people, and the high Priests and the Scribes came together, and led him into their Council,

67 Saying, "Art thou the Christ? tell us. And he said unto them, If I tell you, ye will not believe it.

68 And if also I ask you, ye will not answer me, nor let me go.

69 \*Hereafter shall the Son of man sit at the <sup>y</sup>right hand of the power of God.

70 Then said they all, Art thou then the Son of God? And he said to them, Ye say that I am.

71 Then said they, What need we any further witness? for we our selves have heard it of his own mouth.

hen the whole multitude of them arose, and led him unto

<sup>a</sup>Pilate. 2 And they began to accuse him, saying, We have found this man perverting the people, and \*forbidding to pay tribute to Cesar, saving. That he is Christ a King.

3 \*And Pilate asked him, saying, Art thou the King of the Jewes? And he answered him, and said, Thou saist it.

4 Then said Pilate to the high Priests, and to the people, I find no faute in this man.

5 But they were the more fierce, saying, He moveth the people, teaching through out all Judea, beginning at Galile, even to this place.

6 Now when Pilate heard of Galile, he asked whether the man were a Galilean.

7 And when he knewe that he was of Herod's jurisdiction, he <sup>b</sup>sent him to Herod, which was also at Jerusalem Ain those days. 8 And when Herod saw Jesus, he was exceedingly glad: for he was °desirous to see him of a long season, because he had heard many things of him, and trusted to have seen some ^sign done by him.

9 Then questioned he with him of many things: but he answered him <sup>d</sup>nothing.

10 The high Priests also and Scribes stood forth and accused him vehemently.

11 And Herod with his ^men of war, despised him, and mocked him, and arrayed him in <sup>e</sup>/white, and sent him again to Pilate.

12 And the same day Pilate and Herod were made friends together: for before they were enemies one to another.

13 ¶ Then Pilate called together the high Priests, and the rulers, and the people,

14 And said unto them, Ye have brought this man unto me, as one that perverted the people: and behold, I have examined him before you, and have found no faute in this man, of those things whereof ye accuse him:

15 No, nor yet Herod: for I sent you to him: and lo, nothing worthy of death is done ^to him.

16 I will therefore chastise him, and let him loose.

17 (For of <sup>f</sup>necessity he must have let one loose unto them at the feast.)

18 Then all the multitude cryed at once, saying, Away with him, and deliver to us Barabbas:

19 Which for a certain insurrection made in the city, and murther was cast in prison.

20 Then Pilate spake again to them, willing to let Jesus loose.

21 But they cryed, saying, Crucify, crucify him.

22 \*And he said unto them the third time, But what evil hath he done? I find <sup>9</sup>no cause of death in him: I will therefore chastise him, and let him loose.

23 But they were instant with loud voices, and required that he

might be crucified: and the voices of them and of the high Priests prevailed.

24 So Pilate gave sentence, that it should be as they required. 25 And he let loose unto them him that for insurrection and murther was cast into prison, whom they desired, and delivered Jesus to do with him what they would.

26 ¶ \*And as they led him away, they caught one Simon of Cyrene, coming out of the field, and on him they laid the cross, to bear it after Jesus.

27 And there followed him a great multitude of people, and of women, which women bewailed and lamented him.

28 But Jesus turned back unto them, and said, ^Daughters of Jerusalem, weep not for me, but weep for your selves, and for your children.

29 For behold, the days will come, when men shall say, Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bare, and the pappes which never dave suck.

30 Then shall they begin to say to the mountains, \*Fall on us: and to the hills, Cover us.

31 \*For if they do these things to a <sup>h</sup>green tree, what shalbe done to the dry?

32 \*And there were two others, which were evil doers, led with him to be slain.

33 And when they were come to the place, which is called ^Calverie, there they crucified him, and the evil doers: one at the right hand, and the other at the left.

34 Then said Jesus, Father, forgive them: for they know not what they do. And they parted his rayment, and cast lots.

35 And the people stood, and beheld: and the rulers mocked him with them, saying, He saved others: let him save him self, if he be the Christ, the Chosen of God.

36 The soldiers also mocked him, and came and offered him <sup>k</sup>viengar.

37 And said, If thou be the King of the Jewes, save thy self.

38 And a superscription was also written over him, in Greek letters, and in Latin, and in Hebrew, THIS IS THE KING OF THE JEWES.

39 ¶ And one of the evil doers, which were hanged, railed on him, saying, If thou be the Christ, save thy self and us.

40 But the other answered, and rebuked him, saying, "Fearest thou not God, seeing thou art in the same condemnation?

41 We are in deed righteously here: for we receive things worthy of that we have done: but this man hath done nothing amiss.

42 And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me, when thou comest into thy kingdom.

43 Then Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, to day shalt thou be with me in Paradise.

44 ¶ And it was about the "sixt hour: and there was a darkness over all the land, until the ninth hour.

45 And the sun was darkened, and the vail of the Temple rent through the middes.

46 And Jesus cryed with a loud voice, and said, \*Father, into thine hands I commend my spirit. And when he thus had said, He gave up the ghost.

47 ¶ Now when the <sup>A</sup>Centurion saw what was done, he glorified God, saying, Of a surety this man was just.

48 And all the people that came together to that sight, beholding the things, which were done, smote their breasts, and returned. 49 And all his acquaintance stood a far off, and the women that followed him from Galile, beholding these things.

50 ¶ \*And behold, there was a man named Joseph, which was a counsellor, a good man and a just.

51 He did not consent to the counsel and deed of them, which was of Arimathea, a city of the Jewes: who also him self ^Pwaited for the kingdom of God.

52 He went unto Pilate, and asked the body of Jesus,

53 And took it down, and wrapped it in a linen cloth, and laid it in a tomb hewen out of a rock, wherein was never man yet laid.

54 And that day was the <sup>q</sup>Preparation, and the Sabbath <sup>r</sup>drew on. 55 And the women also that followed after, which came with him from Galile, beheld the sepulchre, and how his body was laid.

56 And they returned and prepared odors, and ointments, and rested the Sabbath *day* according to the commandment.

## Chapter 24

1 The women come to the grave 13 Christ appeareth unto the two disciples that go toward Emmaus. 36 He standeth in the middes to his disciples, and openeth their understanding in the Scriptures 47 He giveth them a charge 51 He ascendeth up to heaven 52 His disciples worship him, 53 And of their daily exercise.

N ow the \*<sup>a</sup>first *day* of the week early in the morning, they came unto the sepulcher, and brought the odors, which they had prepared, and certain *women* with them.

2 And they found the stone rolled away from the sepulcher,

3 And went in, but found not the body of the Lord Jesus.

4 And it came to pass, that as they were amazed thereat, behold, <sup>b</sup>two men suddenly stood by them in shining vestures.

5 And as they were afraid, and bowed down their faces to the earth, they said to them, Why seek ye him that liveth, among the dead?

6 He is not here, but is risen: remember \*how he spake unto you, when he was yet in Galile,

7 Saying, that the son of man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and the third day rise again. 8 And they remembered his words,

9 And returned from the sepulchre, and told all these things unto the eleven, and to all the remnant.

10 Now it was Marie Magdalene and Joanna, and Maire the *mother* of James, and other women with them, which told these things unto the Apostles.

11 But their words seemed unto them, as a fained thing, neither believed they them.

12 Then arose Peter, and ran unto the sepulcher, and looked in,

and saw the linen clothes laid by them selves, and departed wondering in him self at that which was come to pass.

13  $\P$  \*And behold, two of them went that same day to a town which was from Jerusalem about  $^\circ three$  score furlongs, called Emmaus.

14 And they <sup>d</sup>talked together of all these things that were done.
15 And it came to pass, as they communed together, and reasoned, that Jesus him self drew near, and went with them.
16 But their eyes <sup>e</sup>were holden, that they could not know him.

17 And he said unto them, What manner of communications are these that ye have one to another as ye walk, and are sad?

18 And the one (named Cleopas) answered and said unto him, Art thou only a <sup>f</sup>stranger in Jerusalem, and hast not knowen the things which are come to pass therein in these days?

19 And he said unto them, What things? And they said unto him, Of Jesus of Nazaret, which was a Prophet, mighty in deed and in word before God, and all the people,

20 And how the high Priests, and our rulers delivered him to be condemned to death, and have crucified him.

21 But we <sup>9</sup>trusted that it had been he that should have delivered Israel, and as touching all these things, to day is the third day, that they were done.

22 Yea, and certain women among us made us astonied, which came early unto the sepulcher.

23 And when they found not his body, they came, saying, that they had also seen a vision of Angels, which said that he was alive.

24 Therefore certain of them which were with us, went to the sepulcher, and found it even so as the women had said, but him they saw not.

25 Then he said unto them, <sup>h</sup>O fools and slow of heart to believe all that the Prophets have spoken,

26 Ought not Christ to have suffered these things, and to enter into his glory?

27 And he began at <sup>i</sup>Moses, and at all the Prophets, and interpreted unto them in all the Scriptures the things which were *written* of him.

28 And they drew near unto the town, which they went to, but he <sup>k</sup>made as though he would have gone further.

29 But they constrained him, saying, Abide with us, for it is towards night, and the day is far spent. So he went in to tarry with them.

30 And it came to pass, as he sat at table with them, he took the bread, <sup>l</sup>and gave thanks, and brake it, and gave it to them.

31 Then their eyes were opened, and they knewe him: but he was taken out of their sight.

32 And they said between them selves, Did not our hearts burn within us, while he talked with us by the way, and when he opened to us the Scriptures?

33 And they rose up the same hour, and returned to Jerusalem, and found the Eleven gathered together, and them that were with them,

34 Which said, The Lord is risen in deed, and hath appeared to Simon.

35 Then they told what things *were* done in the way, and how he was knowen of them in <sup>m</sup>breaking of bread.

36¶ \*And as they spake these things, Jesus him self stood in the middes of them, and said unto them, Peace *be* to you.

37 But they were abashed and afraid, supposing that they had seen a spirit.

38 Then he said unto them, Why are ye troubled? and wherefore do doubts arise in your hearts?

39 Behold mine hands and my feet: for it is I my self: handle me, and see: for a spirit hath not flesh & bones, as ye see me have. 40 And when he had thus spoken, he shewed them *his* hands and feet.

41 And while they yet believed not for joy, and wondered, he said unto them, Have ye here any meat?

42 And they gave him a piece of a broiled fish, and of an honey comb,

43 And he took it, and did eat before them.

44 And he said unto them, These are the words, which I spake unto you while I was yet with you, that all must be fulfilled which are written of me in the Law of Moses, and in the Prophets, and in the Psalms.

45 Then opened he their understanding, that they might understand the Scriptures.

46 And said unto them, Thus is it written, and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise again from the dead the third day,

47 And that repentance, & remission of sins should be preached in his Name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem.

48 Now ye are witnesses of these things.

49 And behold, I will send the \*promise of my Father upon you: but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem, <sup>a</sup>until ye be endued with power from an high.

50 Afterward he led them out into Bethania, and lift up his hands, and blessed them.

51 And it came to pass, that as he blessed them, \*he departed from them, and was carried up into heaven.
