Chapter 1

2 The office, doctrine and life of John the Baptiste. 9 Christ is baptized, 13 And tempted 14 He preacheth 17 Calleth the fishers 23 Christ healeth the man with the uncleane spirit. 27 New doctrine 29 He healeth Peter's mother in law. 34 The devils know him 41 He clenseth the leper, and healeth divers others.

The abeginning of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God: 2 As it is written in the Prophets, *Behold, I send my bmessenger before thy face, which shall prepare thy way before thee. 3 *The voice of him that cryeth in the wilderness *is*, Prepare the way of the Lord: make his paths straight.

- 4 *John did baptize in the wilderness, and dpreach the baptism of amendment of life, for remission of sinnes.
- 5 And all the country of Judea, and they of Jerusalem went out unto him, and were all baptized of him in the river Jordan, confessing their sinnes.
- 6 Now John was clothed with camel's heere, and with a girdle of a skin about his loins: and he did eat ^*locusts and wild honey, 7 *And preached, saying, A stronger then I, cometh after me, whose shoe's latchet I am not worthie to stoup down, and unlose. 8 Trueth it is, I have *baptized you with *water: but he will baptize
- 9 ¶ *And it came to pass in those days, that Jesus came from Nazaret *a city* of Galile, and was baptized of John in Jordan.
- 10 And assone as ^he was come out of the water, *John* saw the heavens cloven in twain, and the 'holie Ghost descending upon him like a dove.
- 11 Then there was a voice from heaven, *saying*, Thou art my beloved ⁹Son, in whom I am well pleased.
- 12 *And immediately the ^Spirit driveth him into the wilderness. 13 And he was there in the wildemess forty days, and was

htempted of Satan: he was also with the wild beasts, and the Angels ministered unto him.

- 14 ¶ *Now after that John was committed *to prison*, Jesus came into Galile, preaching the Gospel of the kingdom of God,
- 15 And saying, The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand: repent and believe the Gospel.
- 16 \P *And as he walked by the ^sea of Galile, he saw Simon, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea, (for they were fishers.)
- 1 a He shows that John Baptist was the first preacher of the Gospel. 2 *Mal. 3.1.
- 2 b In Greek, Angel, or Ambassador.
- 3 *Is. 40.3, Lk.3.4, John 1.15.

you with the holie Ghost.

- 3 c Take away all lets, which might hinder Christ to come to you. 4 $^{\star}\text{Mt}.3.6.$
- 4 d He did both baptize and preach, but preached first, and after baptized, as appears by Mt. 3.1: so that the order is here inverted, which thing is common in the Scriptures.

- 17 Then Jesus said unto them, Follow me, and I will make you to be kfishers of men.
- 18 And straight way they forsook their nets, and followed him.
- 19 And when he had gone a little further thence, he saw James *the son* of Zebedeus, and John his brother, as they were in the ship, mending their nets.
- 20 And anone he called them: and they left their father Zebedeus in the ship with his hyred servants, and went their way after him.
- 21 ¶ So *they entered into Capernaum, and straight way on the Sabbath day he entered into the Synagogue and taught.
- 22 And they were astonied at his doctrine: *for he taught them as one that had authority, and 'not as the Scribes.
- 23 ¶ And there was in their Synagogue a man which had an unclean spirit, and he cried.
- 24 Saying, Ah, what have we to do with thee, ô Jesus of Nazaret? Art thou come to destroy us? I know thee what thou art, even that holie one of God.
- 25 And Jesus rebuked him, saying, [™]Hold thy peace, and come out of him.
- 26 And the unclean spirit tare him, and cried with a loud voice, and came out of him.
- 27 And they were all amazed, so that they demanded one of another, saying, What thing is this? what "new doctrine is this? for he commandeth the foul spirits with authority, and they obey him. 28 And immediately his fame spread abroad throughout all the region bordering on Galile.
- 29 ¶ *And assone as they were come out of the Synagogue, they entered into the house of Simon & Andrewe, with James & John. 30 And Simon's wive's mother in law lay sick of a fever, and anone they told him of her.
- 31 And he came and took her by the hand, and lift her up, and the fever forsook her by and by, and she ministered unto them. 32 And when even was come, and the sun was down, they brought to him all that were diseased, and them that were possessed with devils.
- 33 And the whole city was gathered together at the door.
- 34 And he healed many that were sick of divers diseases: and he cast out many devils, and $^{\circ}$ suffered not the devils to say that they knewe him.
- 35 And in the morning very early, ^before day *Jesus* arose and went out into a solitary place, and there prayed.
- 36 And Simon, and they that were with him, followed after him. 37 And when they had found him, they said unto him, All men seek for thee.
- 38 Then he said unto them, Let us go into the next towns, that I may preach there also: for I came out for that purpose.
- 39 And he preached in their Synagogues, throughout all Galile, and cast the devils out.
- 40 ¶ *And there came a leper to him, beseeching him, and kneeled down unto him, and said to him, If thou wilt, thou canst make me clean.
- 41 And Jesus had compassion, and put forth his hand, and touched him, and said to him, I will: be thou clean.

- 42 And assone as he had spoken, immediately the leprosy departed from him, and he was made clean.
- 43 And after he had given him a strict pcommandment, he sent him away forthwith.

44 And said unto him, See thou say nothing to any man, but get thee hence, and shewe thy self to "the *Priest, and offer for thy cleansing those things, which Moses commanded, for a 'testimonial unto them.

45 But when he was departed, *he began to tell many things, and to publish the matter: so that Jesus *could no more openly enter into the city, but was without in desert places: and they came to him from every quarter.

Chapter 2

3 He healeth the man of the palsie 5 He forgiveth sinnes. 14 He calleth Levi the customer 16 He eateth with sinners. 18 He excuseth his disciples, as touching fasting, and keeping the Sabbath day.

After *a few days, he entered into Capernaum again, and it was noysed that he was in the ahouse. 2 And anone, many gathered together, in so much that the places about the door could not receive any more: & he preached the word unto them. 3 And there came unto him, that brought one sick of the palsie, borne of four men.

- 4 And because they could not come near unto him for the multitude, they uncovered the roof of the house where he was: and when they had broken it open, they let down the bed, wherein the sick of the palsie lay.
- 5 Now when Jesus saw their faith, he said to the sick of the palsie, Son, thy bsins are forgiven thee.
- 6 And there were certain of the Scribes, sitting there, and reasoning in their hearts,
- 7 Why doeth this man speak such blasphemies? *who can forgive sins, but God only?
- 8 And immediately when Jesus perceived in his spirit, that thus they thought with them selves, he said unto them, Why reason ye these things in your hearts?
- 9 °Whether is it easier to say to the sick of the palsie, Thy sins are forgiven thee? or to say, Arise, and take up thy bed, & walk? 10 And that ye may know, that the Son of man hath authority in earth to forgive sins, (he said unto the sick of the palsie.)
- 11 I say unto thee, Arise and take up thy bed, and get thee hence into thine own house.
- 12 And by and by he arose, and took up his bed, and went forth before them all, insomuch that they were all amazed, and glorified God, saying, "We never saw such a thing.
- 13 ¶ Then he went again toward the sea, and all the people resorted unto him, and he taught them.

Chapter 2

- 5 b By these words Christ showed that he was sent of his Father with authority to take away our sins.
- 7 *Job 14.4, Isa. 43.15.
- 9 c Christ speaks according to their capacity, who were so blind that they would believe nothing, but that which they saw with their eyes, and therefore showed his authority over the soul by the power which he has over the body.
- 12 d Their own consciences cause them to confess the truth.

- 14 *And as Jesus passed by, he saw Levi *the son* of Alpheus sit at the receipt of custom, and said unto him, Follow me. And he arose and followed him.
- 15 \P And it came to pass, as Jesus sat at table in his house, many Publicans and sinners sat at table also with Jesus, and his disciples: for there were many that followed him.
- 16 And when the Scribes and Pharises saw him eat with the Publicans and sinners, they said unto his disciples, How is it, that he eateth and drinketh with Publicans and sinners?
- 17 Now when Jesus heard it, he said unto them, The whole have no need of the physician, but the sick. *I came not to call the *righteous, but the sinners to repentance.
- 18 *And the disciples of John, and the Pharises did fast, and came and said unto him, Why do the disciples of John and of the Pharises fast, and thy disciples fast not?
- 19 And Jesus said unto them, Can the fchildren of the marriage chamber fast, whiles the bridegroom is with them? as long as they have the bridegroom with them, they can not fast.
- 20 But the days will come, when the bridegroom shalbe taken from them, and then shall they fast in those days.
- 21 Also no man soweth a piece ^gof new cloth in an old garment: for els the new *piece* taketh away the filling up from the old, and the breach is worse.
- 22 Likewise, no man putteth new wine into old vessels: for els the new wine breaketh the vessels, & the wine runneth out, and the vessels are lost: but new wine must be put into new vessels.
- 23 ¶ *And it came to pass as he went through the corn on the Sabbath day, that his disciples, as they went on their way, began to pluck the ears of corn.
- 24 And the Pharises said unto him, Behold, why do they on the Sabbath day, that which is not lawful?
- 25 And he said to them, Have ye never read what *David did, when he had need, and was an hungred, *both* he, and they that were with him?
- 26 How he went into the house of God, in the days of hAbiathar the high Priest, and did eat the shewe bread, which were not lawful to eat, but for the *Priests, and gave also to them which were with him?
- 27 And he said to them, The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath.
- 28 Wherefore the Son of man is Lord, and even of the Sabbath.

Chapter 3

1 He healeth the man with the dryed hand. 14 He choseth his Apostles. 21 Christ is thought of the worldelings to be besides him self. 23 He casteth out the unclean spirit, which the Pharises ascribe unto the devil. 29 Blasphemie against the holie Ghost. 35 The brother, sister and mother of Christ.

And *he entered again into the Synagogue, and there was a man which had a withered hand. 2 And they watched him,

whether he would heal him on the Sabbath day, that they might accuse him.

- 3 Then he said unto the man which had the withered hand, Arise: stand forth in the middes.
- 4 And he said to them, Is it lawful to do a good deed on the Sabbath day, or to do evil? to save the life, or to kill? But they aheld their peace.
- 5 Then he looked round about on them bangerly, mourning also for the hardness of their hearts, and said to the man, Stretch forth thine hand. And he stretched it out: and his hand was restored, as whole as the other.
- 6 ¶ And the Pharises departed, & straight way gathered a counsel with the °Herodians against him, that they might destroy him. 7 But Jesus avoided with his disciples to the sea: and a great multitude followed him from Galile, and from Judea,
- 8 And from Jerusalem, and from Idumea, and beyond Jordan: and they that dwelled about Tyrus and Sidon, when they had heard what great things he did, came unto him in great number. 9 And he commanded his disciples, that a ship should wait for him, because of the multitude, lest they should throng him.
- 10 For he had healed many, insomuch that they preassed upon him, to touch him as many as had ^plagues.
- 11 And when the unclean spirits saw him, they fell down before him, and cryed, saying, Thou art the Son of God.
- 12 And he sharply rebuked them, to the end they should not utter him.
- 13 \P *Then he went up into a mountain, and called unto him whom he would, and they came unto him.
- 14 And he appointed twelve that they should be with him, and that he might send them to preach,
- 15 And that they might have power to heal sicknesses and to cast out devils.
- 16 And the first was Simon, and he named Simon, Peter.
- 17 Then James *the son* of Zebedeus, and John, James' brother (and named them Boanerges, which is the sons of thunder.)
- 18 And Andrew, and Philippe, and Bartlemew, and Matthew, and Thomas, and James, *the son* of Alpheus, and ^Thaddeus and Simon the ^Cananite.
- 19 And Judas Iscariot, who also betrayed him, and they came home.
- 20 And the multitude assembled again, so that they could not somuch as eat bread.
- 21 And when his kinsfolks heard of it, they went out to lay hold on him: for they thought he had been beside him self.
- 22¶*And the Scribes which came from Jerusalem, said, He hath Beelzebub, & through the prince of devils he casteth out devils. 23 But he called them unto him, and said unto them in parables, How can Satan drive out Satan?
- 24 For if a kingdom be divided against it self, that kingdom can
- 4 a They held their tongues of malice: for they would neither confess nor deny.
- 5 b Christ is in such sort angry with man that he pities him and seeks to win him.
- 6 c Although they hated one another deadly, yet this hindered them not to join their malice to resist Christ, read Mt. 22.16.

- 25 Or if a house be divided against it self, that house can not continue.
- 26 So if Satan make insurrection against him self, and be divided, he can not endure, but is at an end.
- 27 No man can enter into a strong man's house, and take away his goods, except he first bind that strong man, and then spoil his house.
- 28 ¶ *Verily I say unto you, all sins shall be forgiven unto the children of men, and blasphemies, wherewith they blaspheme: 29 But he that 'blasphemeth against the holie Ghost, shall never have forgiveness, but is culpable of eternal damnation,
- 30 Because they said, He had an unclean spirit.
- 31 \P *Then came his ^brethren and mother, and stood without, and sent unto him, and called him.
- 32 And the people sat about him, and they said unto him, Behold, thy mother, and thy brethren seek for thee without.
- 33 But he answered them, saying, Who is my mother and my brethren?
- 34 And he looked round about on them, which sat in compass about him, and said, Behold my mother and my brethren.
- 35 For whosoever doeth the will of God, he is my brother, and my sister, and mother.

Chapter 4

2 By the parables of the seed, and the mustard com, Christ sheweth the state of the kingdom of God 11 A special gift of God to know the mysteries of his kingdom. 37 He stilleth the tempest of the sea which obeyed him.

And *he began again to teach by the sea side, and there gathered unto him a great multitude, so that he entered into a ship, and sat in the sea, and all the people was by the sea side on the land.

- 2 And he taught them many things in parables, and said unto them in ^ahis doctrine.
- 3 Hearken: Behold, there went out a sower to sow.
- 4 And it came to pass as he sowed, that some fell by the way side, and the fowls of the heaven came and devoured it up.
- 5 And some fell on stony ground, where it had not much earth, and by and by sprang up, because it had not depth of earth.
- 6 But assone as the sun was up, it caught heat, and because it had not root, it withered away.
- 7 And some fell among the thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it, so that it gave no fruit.
- 8 Some again fell in good ground, and did yield fruit that sprong up, and grew, and it brought forth, some thirty fold, some sixty fold, and some an hundred fold.
- 9 Then he said unto them, He that hath bears to hear, let him hear
- 10 And when he was alone, they that were about him with the twelve, asked him of the parable.
- 11 And he said unto them, To cyou it is given to know the mystery

Chapter 4

2 a It is called Christ's doctrine, either for that he was accustomed to speak unto them by similitudes: or els because it had the virtue and majesty that men could not deny but it came from heaven.

2 ^Or, as he taught.

9 b For God does not open all men's hearts to understand his mysteries. 11 c Which are led by the Spirit of God. of the kingdom of God: but unto them that are ^dwithout, all things be done in parables.

- 12 *That they seeing, may see, and not discem: and they hearing, may hear, and not understand, lest at any time they should turn, and their sins should be forgiven them.
- 13 Again he said unto them, Perceive ye not this parable? how then should ye understand all *other* parables?
- 14 The sower soweth the word.
- 15 And these are they that *receive the seed* by the ways side, in whom the word is sowen: but when they have heard it, Satan cometh immediately, and taketh away the word that was sowen in their hearts.
- 16 And likewise they that receive the seed in stony ground, are they, which when they have heard the word, straight ways receive it with gladness.
- 17 Yet have they no root in them selves, and endure but a time: for when trouble and persecution ariseth for the word, immediately they be offended.
- 18 Also they that receive the seed among the thrones, are such as hear the word:
- 19 But the cares of this world, and the *disceifulness of riches, and the lusts of other things enter in, and choke the word, and it is unfruitful.
- 20 But they that have received seed in good ground, are they that hear the word and receive it, and bring forth fruit, one *corn* thirty, another sixty, and some an hundreth.
- 21 ¶ Also he said unto them, *Is *the candle ^light to be put under a bushel, or under the table, and not to be put on a candlestick?
- 22 *For there is nothing hid, that shall not be opened: neither is there a secret, but that it shall come to light.
- 23 If any man have ears to hear, let him hear.
- 24 And he said unto them, Take heed what ye hear. *With ⁹what measure ye mete, it shalbe measured unto you: and unto you that hear, shall more be given.
- 25 *For unto him that hath, shall it be given, and from him that hath not, shalbe taken away, heven that he hath.
- 26 \P Also he said, So is the kingdom of God, as if a man should cast seed in the ground.
- 27 And should sleep, and rise up night and day, and the seed should spring and grow up, he not knowing how.
- 28 For the earth bringeth forth fruit of her self, first the blade, then the ears, after that full corn in the ears.
- 29 And assone as the fruit sheweth it self, anone he putteth in the sickel, because the harvest is come.
- 30 ¶ *He said moreover, Whereunto shall we liken the kingdom of God? or with what comparison shall we compare it?
- 31 *It is* like a grain of mustard seed, which when it is sowen in the earth, is the least of all seeds that be in the earth:
- 11 d And are not of the number of the faithful, neither attain to the pith and substance, but only stay in the outward rind and bark.

- 26 i These two similitudes following prove, that although the kingdom of God seems to have very little appearance or beginning, yet God does increase it above man's reason.
- 26 k If the ministers do their duty, God will give the increase.
- 30 *Mt. 13.31, Lk. 13.18.

- 32 But after that it is sowen, it groweth up, and is greatest of all herbs, and beareth great branches, so that the fowls of heaven may build under the shadow of it.
- 33 And *with many such parables he preached the word unto them, as they were able to hear it.
- 34 And without parables spake he nothing unto them: but he expounded all things to his disciples apart.
- 35 \P *Now the same day when even was come, he said unto them, Let us pass over unto the other side.
- 36 And they left the multitude, and 'took him as he was in the ship: and there were also with him other ships.
- 37 And there arose a great storm of wind, and the waves dashed into the ship, so that it was now full.
- 38 And he was in the stern ^ma sleep on a pillow: and they awoke him, and said to him, Master, carest thou not that we perish?
- 39 And he rose up, and rebuked the wind, and said unto the sea, Peace, and be still. So the wind ceased, and it was a great calm. 40 Then he said unto them, Why are ye so fearful? ^how is it that
- ye have no faith?
 41 And they feared exceedingly, and said one to another, Who is this, that both the wind and the sea obey him?

Chapter 5

8 Jesus casteth the devils out of the man and suffereth them to enter into the swine 25 He healeth a woman from the bloodie issue, 41 And raiseth the captain's daughter.

And *they came over to the other side of the sea into the country of the Gadarens. 2 And when he was come out of the ship, there met him incontinently out of the graves, a man which had an unclean spirit:

- 3 Who had his abyding among the graves, and no man could bind him, no not with chains,
- 4 Because that when he was often bound with fetters and chains, he plucked the chains a sondre, and brake the fetters in pieces, neither could any man tame him.
- 5 And always both night and day he cryed in the mountains, and in the graves, and stroke him self with stones.
- 6 And when he saw Jesus a far off, he ran, and worshipped him, 7 And cryed with a loud voice, and said, ^aWhat have I to do with thee, Jesus, the Son of the most high God? ^I charge thee by ^bGod, that thou torment me not.
- 8 (For he said unto him, Come out of the man, thou unclean spirit)
- 9 And he asked him, What is thy name? and he answered saying. My name is °Legion: for we are many.
- 10 And he prayed him instantly, that he would not send them away out of the country.
- 11 Now there was there in the mountains a great herd of swine, feeding.
- 12 And all the devils besought him, saying, Send us into the swine, that we may enter into them.
- 13 And incontinently Jesus gave them leave. Then the unclean spirits went out and entered into the swine, and the herd ^ran

- 18 And when he was come into the ship, he that had been possessed with the devil, prayed him that he might be with him. 19 Howbeit, Jesus would not suffer him, but said unto him, Go thy way home to thy friends, and 'shewe them what great things the Lord hath done unto thee, and *how* he hath had compassion on thee.
- 20 So he departed, and began to publish in Decapolis, what great things Jesus had done unto him: and all men did marvel. 21 ¶ And when Jesus was come over again by ship unto the other side, a great multitude gathered to him, and he was near unto the sea.
- 22 *And behold, there came one of the rulers of the Synagogue, whose name was Jairus: and when he saw him, he fell down at his feet,
- 23 And besought him instantly, saying, My little daughter lieth at point of death: *I pray thee* that thou woldest come and lay thine hands on her, that she may be healed, and live.
- 24 Then he went with him, and a great multitude followed him, and thronged him.
- 25 (And there was a certain woman, which was diseased with an issue of blood twelve years,
- 26 And had suffered many things of many physicions, and had spent all that she had, and it availed her nothing, but she became much worse.
- 27 When she had heard of Jesus, she came in the press behind, and ${}^{\rm q}$ touched his garment.
- 28 For she said, If I may but touch his clothes, I shall be whole, 29 And straight way ^the course of her blood was dryed up, and she ^felt in her body, that she was healed of that ^plague.
- 30 And immediately when Jesus did know in him self the virtue that went out of him, he turned him round about in the press, and said, Who hath touched my clothes?
- 31 And his disciples said unto him, Thou seest the multitude throng thee, and sayest thou, Who did touch me?
- 32 And he looked round about, to see her that had done that.
- 33 And the woman feared and trembled: for she knewe what was done in her, and she came and fell down before him, and told him the whole truth.
- 34 And he said to her, Daughter, thy faith hath made thee whole: go in peace, and be whole of thy ^plague.)
- 35 While he yet spake, there came from the *same* ruler of the Synagogue's house *certain* which said, Thy daughter is dead: why diseasest thou the Master any further?

3 Is not this the carpenter Marie's son, the ^brother of James and Joses, and of Juda and Simon? and are not his sisters here with us? And they were boffended in him.

- 4 Then Jesus said unto them, A *Prophet is not without honor, but in his own country, and among his own kindred, and in his own house.
- 5 And °he could there do no great works save that he laid his hands upon a few sick folk, and healed *them.*
- 6 *And he marveled at their unbelief, and went about by the towns on every side, teaching.
- 7 ¶ *And he called the twelve, and began to send them two and two, and gave them power over unclean spirits.
- 8 And commanded them, that they should take noting for *their* journey, save a staff only: neither escrip, neither bread, neither money in their *\(^{\text{qirdles}}\),
- 9 But that they should be shod with *fsandals, and that they should not put on two coats.
- 10 And he said unto them, Wheresoever ye shall enter into an

11 *And whosoever shall not receive you, nor hear you, when ye depart thence, h*shake off the dust that is under your feet, for a witness unto them. Verily I say unto you, It shalbe easier for Sodom, or Gomorrha at the day of judgement, then for that city. 12 ¶ And they went out and preached, that *men* should amend their lives.

13 And they cast out many devils: and they *anointed many that were sick, with oil and healed *them.*

14 ¶ *Then King Herod heard *of him* (for his name was spied abroad) and said, John Baptist is risen again from the dead and therefore great works are wrought by him.

15 Other said, It is Elias: and some said, It is a Prophet, or as one $^{\rm k}$ of the Prophets.

16 *So when Herof heard it, he said, It is John whom I beheaded: he is 'risen from the dead.

17 For Herod him self had sent forth, and had taken John, and bound him in prison for Herodias' sake, which was his brother Philippe's wife, because he had married her.

18 For John said unto Herod, *It is not "lawful for thee to have thy brother's wife.

19 Therefore Herodias had a quarrel against him, and would have killed him, but she could not:

20 For Herod feared John, knowing that he *was* a just man, and an holie, and reverenced him, and when he heard him, he did many things, and heard him gladly.

21 But many time being convenient, when Herod on his birth day made a banket to his princes and captains, and chief estates of Galile:

22 And the daughter of the same Herodias came in and °danced, and pleased Herod and them that sate at table together, the King said unto the maid, Ask of me what thou wilt, & I will give it thee. 23 And he sware unto her, Whatsoever thou shalt ask of me, I will give it thee, even unto the halfe of my kingdom.

24 *So she went forth, and said to her mother, What shall I ask? And she said, John Baptist's head.

25 Then she came in straight way with haste unto the King, and asked, saying, I would that thou shuldest give me even now in a charger the head of John Baptist.

26 Then the King was very sorye: *yet* for his othe's sake, and for their sakes which sate at table with him, he would not refuse her. 27 And immediately the King sent the hangman, and gave charge that his head shulde be brought. So he went and beheaded him in the prison,

28 And brought his head in a charger, and gave it to the pmaid,

29 And when his disciples heard it, they came and took up his ^body, and put it in a tombe.

30 \P *And the Apostles gathered them selves together to Jesus, and \P told him all things, both what they had done, and what they had taught.

31 And he said unto them, Come ye apart into the wilderness, and rest a while: for there were many comers and goers, that they had not leisure to eat.

32 *So they went by ship out of the way into a desert place.

33 But the people saw them when they departed, and many knewe him, and ran a foot thither out of all cities, and came thither before them, and assembled unto him.

34 *Then Jesus went out, and saw a great multitude, and had compassion on them, because they were like sheep which had no shepherde: *and he began to teach them many things.

35 *And when the day was now far spent, his disciples came unto him, saying, This is a desert place, and now the day is far passed.

41 And he took the five loaves, and the two fishes, and looked up to heaven, and gave thanks and brake the loaves, and gave them to his disciples to set before them, and the two fishes he divided among them all.

42 So they did all eat, and were satisfied.

43 And they took up twelve baskets full of the fragments, and of the fishes.

44 And they that had eaten, were about five thousand men.

45 ¶ And straight way he caused his disciples to go into the ship, and to go before unto the other side unto Bethsaida, while he sent away the people.

46 Then assone as he had sent them away, he departed into a mountain to pray.

47 *And when even was come, the ship was in the middes of the sea, and he alone on the land.

48 And he saw them troubled in rowing, (for the wind was contrary unto them) & about the fourth *watch of the night, he came unto them, walking upon the sea, & would have passed by them. 49 And when they saw him walking upon the sea, they supposed

50 For they all saw him, and were sore afraid: but anone he talked with them, and said unto them, Be ^yof good comfort: it is I. be not afraid.

- 3 (For the Pharises, and all the Jewes, except they wash their hands ^boft, eat not, holding the tradition of the Elders.
- 4 And when they come from the market, except they wash, they eat not: and many other things there be, which they have taken upon them to observe, as the washing of cups, and °pottes, and of brasen vessels, and of tables.)
- 5 Then ask him the Pharises and Scribes, Why walk not thy disciples according to the tradition of the Elders, but eat ^meat with unwasshen hands?
- 6 Then he answered and said unto them, Surely *Esai hath prophesied well of you, hypocrites, as it is written, This people honoreth me with their dlips, but their heart is far away from me.
- 7 But they worship me in vain, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men.
- 8 For ye lay the commandment of God apart, and observe the tradition of men, as the washing of pottes and of cups, and many

- 9 And he said unto them, Well, ye reject the commandment of God that ye may observe your own tradition.
- 10 For Moses said, *Honor thy father, and thy mother: and, *Whosoever shall curse father or mother, let him 'dye the death.
- 11 But ye say, If a man say to father or mother, Corban, *that is,* By the gift that is *offered* by me, thou maist have profit, *he shall be free.*
- 12 So ye suffer him no more to do any thing for his father, or his mother.
- 13 Making the word of God of none authority, by your tradition which ye have ordained: and ye do many such like things.
- 14 *Then he called the whole multitude unto him, and said unto them, Hearken you all unto me, and understand.
- 15 There gis nothing without a man, that can defile him, when it entreth into him: but the things which proceed out of him, are they which defile the man.
- 16 If any have ears to hear, let him hear.
- 17 And when he came into an house *away* from the people, his disciples asked him concerning the parable.
- 18 And he said unto them, What? are ye without understanding also? Do ye not know that whatsoever thing from without entreth into a man, can not defile him,
- 19 Because it entreth not into his heart, but into the bellie, and goeth out into the draught which is the purging of all meats?
- 20 Then he said, That which cometh out of man, that defileth man.
- 21 *For from within, even out of the heart of men, proceed evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murthers,
- 22 Thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, ^uncleanness, a ^wicked eye, backbiting, pride, foolishness.
- 23 All these evil things come from within, and defile a man.
- 24 ¶ *And from thence he rose, and went into the borders of Tyrus and Sidon, and entered into an house, and would that no man should have knowen: but he could not be hid.
- 25 For a certain woman, whose little daughter had an unclean spirit, heard of him, and came, and fell at his feet.
- 26 (And the woman was a Greek, a Syrophenissan by nation) and she besought him that he would cast out the devil out of her daughter.
- 27 But Jesus said unto her, Let the hchildren first be fed: for it is not good to take the children's bread, & to cast it unto hwhelpes. 28 Then she answered, and said unto him, Trueth, Lord: yet in deed the whelpes eat under the table of the children's kcrommes. 29 Then he said unto her, For this saying go thy way: the devil is
- gone out of thy daughter.

 30 And when she was come home to her house, she found the
- devil departed, and her daughter lying on the bed.
 31 ¶ And he departed again from the coasts of Tyrus and Sidon, and came unto the sea of Galile, through the middes of the coasts of Decapolis.

in his speech, and prayed him to put his hand upon him.

- 33 Then he took him aside from the multitude, and put his fingers in his ears, and did spit, and touched his tongue.
- 34 And looking up to heaven, he 'sighed, and said unto him, Ephphatha, that is, Be opened.
- 35 And straight way his ears were opened, and the string of his tongue was losed, and he spake plain.
- 36 And he commanded them, that they should tell no man: but how much soever he forbad them, the more a great deal they published it,

In *those days, when there was a very great multitude, and had nothing to eat, Jesus called his disciples to him, and said unto them,

- 2 I have ^acompassion on the multitude, because they have now continued with me three days, and have nothing to eat.
- 3 And if I send them away fasting to their own houses, they would faint by the way: for some of them came from far.
- 4 Then his disciples answered him, ^How can a man satisfy these bwith bread here in the wilderness?
- 5 And he asked them, How many loaves have ye? And they said, Seven.
- 6 Then he commanded the multitude to sit down on the ground: and he took the seven loaves, and gave thanks, brake *them*, and gave to his disciples to set before *them*, and they did set *them* before the people.
- 7 They had also a few small fishes: and when he had given thanks, he commanded them also to be set before *them*.
- 8 So they did eat, and were sufficed, and they took up of the broken meat that was left, seven baskets full,
- 9 (And they that had eaten, were about four thousand) so he sent them away.
- 10 ¶ *And anone he entered into a ship with his disciples, and came into the parties of °Dalmanutha.
- 11 *And the Pharises came forth, and began to dispute with him, seeking of him a sign from heaven, and tempting him.
- 12 Then he disighed deeply in his spirit, and said, Why doeth this generation seek a sign? Verily I say unto you, Afa sign shall not

- 13 ¶ So he left them, and went into the ship again, and departed to the other side.
- 14 \P *And they had forgotten to take bread, neither had they in the ship with them, but one loaf.
- 15 And he charged them, saying, Take heed, and beware of the gleaven of the Pharises, and of the leaven of Herod.
- 16 And they thought among them selves, saying, *It is,* because we have no bread.
- 17 And when Jesus knewe it, he said unto them, Why reason you *thus* because ye have no bread? perceive ye not yet, neither understand? have ye your hearts yet hardened?
- 18 Have ye eyes and see not? and have ye ears, and hear not? and do ye not remember?
- 19 *When I brake the five loaves among five thousand, how many baskets full of broken meat took ye up? They said unto him, Twelve.
- 20 And when *I brake* seven among four thousand, how many baskets of the leavings of broken meat took ye up? And they said, Seven.
- 21 Then he said unto them, how is it that ye understand not?
- 22 And he came to Bethsaida, and they brought a blind man unto him, and desired him to touch him.
- 23 Then he took the blind by the hand, and led him out of the town, and spit in his eyes, and put his hands upon him, and asked him, if he saw ought.
- 24 And he looked up, and said, I see men: for I see them walking like trees.
- 25 After that, he put his hands again upon his eyes, and made him look again. And he was restored to his sight, and saw every man a far off clearly.
- 26 And he sent him home to his house, saying, Neither go into the town, nor tell it to any in the town.
- 27 ¶ *And Jesus went out, and his disciples into the towns of Cesarea Philippi. And by the way he asked his disciples, saying unto them, Whom do men say that I am?
- 28 And they answered, *Some say* John Baptist: and some, Elias: and some, one of the Prophets.
- 29 And he said unto them, But whom say ye that I am? Then Peter answered and said unto him, Thou art the Christ.

38 *For whosoever shalbe ashamed of me, and of my words among this adulterous and sinful generation, of him shall the Son of man be ashamed also, when he cometh in the glory of his Father with the holie Angels.

- 5 Then Peter answered, and said unto Jesus, Master, it is good for us to be here: let us make also three tabernacles, one for thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elias.
- 6 °Yet he knewe not what he said: for they were afraid.
- 7 And there was a cloud that shadowed them, & a voice came out of the cloud, saying, *This is my beloved Son: hear him.
- 8 And suddenly they looked round about, and saw no more any man save Jesus only with them.
- 9 *And as they came down from the mountain, he charged them that they should tell no man what they had seen save when the Son of man were risen from the dead again.
- 10 So they kept that matter to them selves, and demanded one of another, what the rising from the dead again should mean?
- 11 Also they asked him, saying, Why say the Scribes, that *Elias emust first come?
- 12 And he answered, and said unto them, Elias verily shall first come and restore all things: and *as it is written of the Son of man, he must suffer many things, and be set at nought.
- 13 But I say unto you, that Elias is come, (and they have done

unto him whatsoever they would) as it is *written of him.

- 14 ¶ *And when he came to his gdisciples, he saw a great multitude about them, and the Scribes disputing with them.
- 15 And straight way all the people, when they beheld him, were amazed, and ran to him, and saluted him.
- 16 Then he asked the Scribes, What dispute you ^among your
- 17 And one of the company answered, and said, Master, I have brought my son unto thee, which hath a domme spirit:
- 18 And wheresoever he taketh him, he hteareth him, and he fometh, and gnassheth his teeth, and pineth away: and I spake to thy disciples that they should cast him out, and they could not. 19 Then he answered him, and said, O faithless generation, how long now shall I be with you! how long now shall I suffer you! Bring him unto me.
- 20 So they brought him unto him: & assone as the spirit saw him, he tare him, & he fell down on the ground, wallowing & foaming. 21 Then he asked his father, How long time is it since he hath been thus? And he said, Of a child.
- 22 And oft times he casteth him into the fyre, and into the water to destroy him: but if thou canst do any thing, help us, and have compassion upon us.
- 23 And Jesus said unto him, If kthou canst believe it, all things are possible to him that believeth.
- 24 And straight way the father of the child crying with tears, said, Lord, I believe: help my "unbelief.
- 25 When Jesus saw that the people came running together, he rebuked the unclean spirit, saying unto him, Thou domme and deaf spirit, I charge thee, come out of him, and enter no more into him.
- 26 Then the spirit cryed, and rent him sore, and came out, and he was as one dead, in so much that many said, He is dead.
- 27 But Jesus took his hand and lift him up and he rose.
- 28 And when he was come into the house, his disciples asked him secretly, Why could not we cast him out?

- 13 And seeing a fig tree a far off, that had leaves, he went to see if he might find any thing thereon: but when he came unto it, he found nothing but leaves: for the time of figs was not yet.
- 14 Then Jesus answered, and said to it, ¹Never man eat fruit of thee hereafter while the world standeth: & his disciples heard it.
- 15 ¶ And they came to Jerusalem, and Jesus went into the Temple, and began to cast out them that sold and bought in the Temple, and overthrew the tables of the money changers, and the seats of them that sold doves.
- 16 Neither would he suffer that any man should carry a vessel through the Temple.
- 17 And he taught, saying unto them, Is it not written, *Mine House shalbe called the House of prayer unto all nations? *but you have made it a den of thieves.
- 18 And the Scribes and high Priests heard it, and sought how to ⁹destroy him: for they feared him, because the whole multitude was astonied at his doctrine.
- 19 But when even was come, Jesus went out of the city.
- 20 \P *And in the morning as they passed by, they saw the fig tree dryed up from the roots.
- 21 Then Peter remembered, and said unto him, Master, behold, the fig tree which thou cursedst, is withered.

And he began to speak unto them in parables, *A certain man planted a vineyard, and compassed it with an hedge, and digged a pit for the awinepress, and built a tower in it, and let it out to husband men, and went into a strange country.

- 2 And at a time, he sent to the husband men a servant, that he might receive of the husband men of the fruit of the vineyard.
- 3 But they took him, and bet him, and sent him away empty.
- 4 And again, he sent unto them another servant, and at him they cast stones, and brake his head, and sent him away shamefully handled.
- 5 And again he sent another, and him they slew, and many other, beating some, and killing some.
- 6 Yet had he one son, his derebeloved: him also he sent the last unto them, saying, They will reverence my son.
- 7 But the husband men said among them selves, This is the heir: come, ley us kill him, and the inheritance shalbe ours.
- 8 So they took him, & killed him, & cast him out of the vineyard. 9 What shall then the Lord of the vineyard do? He bwill come and destroy these husband men, and give the vineyard to others.
- 10 Have ye not read so much as this Scripture? *The stone which the builders did refuse, is made the head of the corner.
- 11 This 'was done of the Lord, and it is marvelous in our eyes.
- 12 Then they went about to take him, but they feared the people: for they perceived that he spake that parable against them: therefore they left him, and went their way.
- 13 ¶ *And they sent unto him certain of the Pharises, and of the Herodians that they might take him in *his* talk.
- 14 And when they came, they said unto him, Master, we know that thou art true, and carest for no man: for thou considerest not the ^dperson of men, but teachest the ^eway of God truly, Is it lawful to give tribute to Cesar, or not?
- 15 Should we give it, or should we not give it? But he knewe their hypocrisy, and said unto them, 'Why tempt ye me? Bring me a penny, that I may see it.
- 16 So they brought it, and he said unto them, Whose is this image and superscription? and they said unto him, Cesar's.
- 17 Then Jesus answered, and said unto them, *Give to Cesar

the things that are Cesar's, and to God, those that are God's: and they marveled at him.

- 18 ¶ *Then came the Sadduces unto him, (which say, there is no resurrection) and they asked him, saying,
- 19 Master, *Moses wrote unto us, If any man's brother die, and leave *his* wife, and leave no children, that ⁹his brother should take his wife, and raise up seed unto his brother.
- 20 There were seven brethren, and the first took a wife, and when he died, left no issue.
- 21 Then the second took her, and he died, neither did he yet leave issue, and the third likewise.
- 22 So seven had her, & left no issue: last of all the wife died also. 23 In the resurrection then, when they shall rise again, whose wife shall she be of them? for seven had her to wife?
- 24 Then Jesus answered, and said unto them, Are ye not therefore deceived, because ye know not the Scriptures, neither the power of God?
- 25 For when they shall rise again from the dead, neither men marry, nor wives are married, but are has the Angels which are in heaven.
- 26 And as touching the dead, that they shall rise again, have ye not read in the book of Moses, how in the bush God spake unto him, saying, I *am the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob?
- 27 He is not the God of the dead, but the God of the living. Ye are therefore greatly deceived.
- 28 ¶ *Then came one of the Scribes that had heard them disputing together, *and* perceiving that he had answered them well, he asked him, Which is the first commandment of all?
- 29 Jesus answered him, The first of all the commandments *is*, *Hear, Israel, The Lord our God is the only Lord.
- 30 Thou shalt therefore love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy ^mind, and with all thy strength: this is the first commandment.
- 31 And the second *is* *like, that is, *Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thy self. There is none other commandment greater then these.
- 32 Then the Scribe said unto him, Well Master, thou hast said the truth, that there is one God, and that there is none but he,
- 33 And to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the soul, and with all the strength, and to love *his* neighbor as him self, is more then all burnt offerings and sacrifices.
- 34 Then, when Jesus saw that he answered discretely, he said unto him, Thou mart not far from the kingdom of God. And no man after that durst ask him any question.

- 7 Furthermore when ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars, be ye not troubled: for *such things* must needs be: but the end *shall* not *be* yet.
- 8 For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there shalbe earthquakes in divers quarters, and there shalbe famine and troubles: these *are* the beginnings of sorrows. 9 But take ye heed to your selves: for they shall deliver you up to

- 11 *But when they lead you, and deliver you up, take ye no dthought afore, neither premeditate what ye shall say: but whatsoever is given you at the same time, that speak: for it is not ye that speak, but the holie Ghost.
- 12 Yea, and the brother shall deliver the brother to death, and the father the son, and the children shall rise against their parents, and shall cause them to die.
- 13 And ye shalbe hated of all men for my Name's sake: but whosoever shall endure unto the end, he shalbe saved.
- 14 *Moreover, when ye shall see the abomination of desolation (spoken of by *Daniel the Prophet) fstanding where it ought not, (let him that readeth, consider it) *then let them that be in Judea, flee into the fmountains,
- 15 And let him that is upon the house, not come down into the house, neither enter therein, to fetch any thing out of his house. 16 And let him that is in the field, not turn back again unto the things which he left behind him, to take his clothes.
- 17 Then wo shalbe to them that are with hchild, and to them that give suck in those days.
- 18 Pray therefore that your flight be not in the winter.
- 19 For there shalbe in those days such tribulation, as was not from the beginning of the creation which God created unto this time, neither shalbe.
- 20 And except that the Lord had shortened those days, no 'flesh should be saved: but for the elect's sake, which he hath chosen, he hath shortened those days.
- 21 Then *if any man say to you, Lo, here is Christ, or, lo, he is there, believe it not.
- 22 For false Christs shall rise, and false Prophets, & shall shewe signs and wonders, to deceive if it were *possible, the very elect. 23 But take ye heed: behold, I have shewed you all things before.
- 24 ¶ Moreover *in those days, after that tribulation the sun shall wax dark, and the moon shall not give her light,
- 25 And the mstars of heaven shall fall: and the powers which are in heaven, shall shake.
- 26 *And then shall they see the Son of man coming in the clouds, with great power and glory.

- 5 For it might have been sold for more then bthree hundreth pence, & been given unto the poor, cathey grudged against her. 6 But Jesus said, Let her alone: why trouble ye her? she hath wrought a good work on me.
- 7 For ye have the poor with you always, and when ye will ye may do them good, but me ye shall not have always.
- 8 She hath done that she could: she came afore hand to anoint my body to the burying.
- 9 Verily I say unto you, wheresoever this Gospel shalbe preached throughout the whole world, this also that she hath done, shalbe spoken of in remembrance of her.

high Priests, to betray him unto them.

- 11 And when they heard it, they were glad, and promised that they would give him money: therefore he sought how he might conveniently betray him.
- 12 ¶ *Now the first day of unleavened bread, when they sacrificed the Passover, his disciples said unto him, Where wilt thou that we go and prepare, that thou maist eat the Passover? 13 Then he sent forth two of his disciples, and said unto them, Go ye into the city, and there shall a man met you bearing a pitcher of water: follow him.
- 14 And whithersoever he goeth in, say ye to the good man of the house, The Master saith, Where is the lodging where I shall eat the Passover with my disciples?
- 15 And he will shewe you an upper chamber *which is* large, trimmed and prepared: there make it ready for us.
- 16 So his disciples went forth, and came to the city, and found as he had said unto them, and made ready the Passover.
- 17 ¶ And at even he came with the twelve.
- 18 *And as they sat at table and did eat, Jesus said, Verily I say unto you, that one of you shall betray me, which eateth with me. 19 Then they began to be sorrowful and to say to him one by one, Is it I? And another, Is it I?
- 20 *And he answered and said unto them, *It is* one of the twelve that °dippeth with me in the platter.
- 21 *Truly the Son of man goeth his way, as it is fwritten of him: but wo be to that man, by whom the Son of man, is betrayed: it had been good for that man, if he had never been born.
- 22 *And as they did eat, Jesus 9took the bread, and when he had given thanks, he brake it and gave it to them, and said, *Take, eat, this is my body.
- 23 Also he took the cup, and when he had ^hgiven thanks, gave it to them: and they all drank of it.
- 24 And he said unto them, This is my blood of the new Testament, which is shed for many.

- 26 And when they had sung a pslam, they went out to the mount of olives.

- 28 But after that I am risen, I will go into *Galile before you.
- 29 And Peter said unto him, Although all men should be offended, yet would not I.
- 30 Then Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, this day, *even* in this night, before the cock crow twise, thou shalt deny me thrise.
- 31 But he said more earnestly, If I should die with thee, I will not deny thee: likewise also said they all.

said to his disciples, Sit ye here, till I have prayed.

- 33 And he took with him Peter, and James, and John, and he began *to be afraid, and in great heaviness,
- 34 And said unto them, My soul is very heavy, *even* unto the death, tarry here and watch.
- 35 So he went forward a little, and fell down on the ground, and prayed, that if it were possible, that hour might pass from him.
- 36 And he said, 'Abba, Father, all things are possible unto thee: take away this cup from me: nevertheless not that I will, but that thou "wilt, be done.
- 37 Then he came and found them sleeping, and said to Peter, Simon, slepest thou? coldest not thou watch one hour?
- 38 ¶ Watch ye, and pray, that ye enter not into tentation: the spirit in deed is ready, but the flesh is weak.
- 39 And again he went away, & prayed, & spake the same words. 40 And he returned, and found them asleep again: for their eyes were heavy: neither knewe they what they should answer him.
- 41 And he came the third time, and said unto them, "Sleep hence forth, and take your rest: it is enough: the hour is come: behold, the Son of man is delivered into the hands of sinners.
- 42 Rise up: let us go: lo, he that betrayeth me, is at hand.
- 43 *And immediately while he yet spake, came Judas that was one of the twelve, and with him a great multitude with swords and staves from the high Priests, and Scribes and Elders.

58 We heard him say, *I will destroy this Temple made with hands, and within three days I will build another, made without hands.

8 And the people cryed a loud, and began to desire *that he* would do as he had ^cever done unto them.

9 Then Pilate answered them, and said, Will ye that I let loose unto you the King of the Jewes?

10 For he knewe that the high Priests had delivered him of envy.
11 But the high Priests had moved the people *to desire* that he would rather deliver Barabbas unto them.

12 And Pilate answered, and said again unto them, What will ye then that I do with him, whom ye call the King of the Jewes?

13 And they cryed again, Crucify him.

14 Then Pilate said unto them, But what evil hath he done? And they cried the more fervently, Crucify him.

15 So Pilate ^dwilling to content the people, losed them Barabbas, and delivered Jesus when he had scourged him, that he might be crucified.

16 Then the soldiers led him away into the hall, which is the ^common hall, and called together the whole band,

17 And clad him with purple, and platted a crown of thorns, and put it about *his head*,

18 And began to salute him, saying, Hail, King of the Jewes.

19 And they smote him on the head with a 'reed, and spat upon him, and bowed the knees, and did him reverence.

20 *And when they had mocked him, they took the purple off him, and put his own clothes on him, and led him out to crucify him.

24 And when they had crucified him, they parted his garments, casting lots for them, what every man should have.

25 And it was 9the third hour, when they crucified him.

26 And the title of his cause was written above, THE KING OF THE JEWES.

27 They crucified also with him two thieves, the one on the right

28 Thus the Scripture was fulfilled, which saith, *And he was counted among the wicked.

29 And they that went by, railed on him, wagging their heads, and saying, *Hey, thou that destroyest the Temple, and buildest it in three days,

30 Save thy self, and come down from the cross.

31 Likewise also even the high Priests mocking, said among them selves with the Scribes, He saved other men, him self he can not save.

32 Let Christ the King of Israel now come down from the cross, that we may see, and believe. ^hThey also that were crucified with him, reviled him.

33 ¶ Now when the sixth hour was come, darkness arose over 'all the land until the ninth hour.

34 And at the kninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, *Eloi, Eloi, lamma-sabachthani? which is by interpretation, My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?

35 And some of them that stood by, when they heard it, said, Behold, he calleth Elias.

36 And one ran, and filled a *sponge full of vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave him to drink, saying, Let him alone: let us see if Elias will come and take him down.

37 And Jesus cried with a loud voice, and gave up the gost.

 $38\,\P$ And the vail of the Temple was rent in twain, from the top to the bottom.

39 Now when the "Centurion, which stood over against him, saw that he thus crying gave up the gost, he said, Truly this man was the Son of God.

40 ¶ There were also women, which beheld a far off, among whom was, Marie Magdalene, and Marie (the mother of James the less, and of Joses) and Salome,

41 Which also when he was in Galile, *followed him and ministered unto him, and many other women which came up with him unto Jerusalem.

42 ¶ *And now when night was come (because it was the day of the preparation that is before the Sabbath)

43 Joseph of Arimathea, an honorable Counsellour, which also looked for the kingdom of God, came, and went in boldly unto Pilate, and ask the body of Jesus.

44 And Pilate marveled, if he were already dead, and called unto him the Centurion, and asked of him whether he had been any while dead.

45 And when he knewe *the truth* of the Centurion, he gave the body to Joseph.

46 Who brought a linen cloth, and took him down, and wrapped him in the linen cloth, and layed him in a tomb that was hewn out of a rock, and rolled a stone unto the door of the sepulchre:

47 And Marie Magdalene, and Marie Joses' *mother* beheld where he should be layed.

And *when the Sabbath day was past, Marie Magdalene, and Marie the *mother* of James, and Salome, brought sweet ointments that they might come, and embalm him.

2 Therefore early in the morning, the first day of the week, they came unto the sepulchre, when the sun was 'yet rising,

3 And they said one to another, Who shall roll us away the stone from the door of the sepulchre?

4 And when they looked, they saw that the stone was rolled away (for it was a very great one.)

5 *So they went into the sepulchre, and saw ^aa young man sitting at the right side, clothed in a long white robe: & they were afraid. 6 But he said unto them, Be not afraid: ye seek Jesus of Nazaret, which hath been crucified: he is risen, he is not here: behold the place, where they put him.

7 But go your way, and tell his disciples, and ^bPeter, that he will go before you into Galile: there shall ye see him, *as he said unto you.

8 And they went out quickly and fled from the sepulchre: for they trembled and were amazed: neither said they any thing to any man: for they were afraid.

9 ¶ And when Jesus was risen again, in the morrow (which was the first day of the week) he appeared first to Marie Magdalene, *out of whom he had cast seven devils.

10 And she went and told them that had been with him, which mourned and wept.

11 And when they heard that he was alive, and had appeared to her, they °believed it not.

12 ¶ *After that, he appeared unto two of them in another form, as they walked and went into the country.

13 And they went and told it to the remnant, but they believed them not.
