#### AN EXCELLENT 'SONG WHICH WAS SALOMON'S

The Argument.

In this Song, Salomón by most sweet and comfortable allegories and parables describeth the perfect love of Jesus Christ, the true Salomón and King of peace, and the faithful soul or his Church, which he hath sanctified and appointed to be his spouse, holy, chaste and without reprehension. So that here is declared the singular love of the bridegroom toward the bride, and his great and excellent benefits wherewith he doeth enrich her of his pure bountie and grace without any of her deservings. Also the earnest affection of the Church which is inflamed with the love of Christ desiring to be more and more joyned to him in love, and not to be forsaken for any spot or blemish that is in her.

- 8 I have compared thee, ô my love, to the troupe of horses in the <sup>q</sup>charets of Pharaóh.
- 9 Thy cheeks are comelie with rows of stones, and thy neck with

- 11 'Whiles the King was at his repast, my spikenarde gave the smell thereof.
- 12 My welbeloved *is as* a bundle of myrrh unto me: he shall lie between my <sup>s</sup>breasts.

- am the rose of the field, *and* the lily of the valleys. 2 Like a lily among the thorns, so *is* my alove among the daughters. 3 bLike the apple tree among the trees of the forest: so *is* my welbeloved among the sons *of men*: under his shadow had I delite, and sat down: and his fruit *was* sweet unto my mouth.
- 4 He brought me into the wine cellar, and love was his banner over me.
- 5 Stay me with flagons, and comfort me with apples: for I am sick of love.
- 6 His left hand *is* under mine head, and his right hand doeth embrace me.
- 7 °I charge you, ô daughters of Jerusalém, by the roes, and by the hinds of the field, that ye stir not up, nor waken *my* love, until she please.
- 8 dt is the voice of my welbeloved, behold, he cometh leaping by the mountains, and skipping by the hills.
- 9 My welbeloved is like a roe, or a young heart: lo, he  $^{\circ}$ standeth behind our wall, looking forth of the windows, shewing him self through the  $^{\rm f}$ grates.
- 10 My welbeloved spake and said unto me, Arise, my love, my fair one, and come thy way.
- 11 For behold, <sup>9</sup>winter is past: the rain is changed, and is gone away.
- 12 The flowers appear in the earth: the time of the singing of birds is come, and the voice of the turtle is heard in our land.
- 13 The fig tree hath brought forth her young figs, and the vines with *their* small grapes have cast a savor: arise my love, my fair one, and come away.
- 14 My dove, that art in the holes of the rock, in the secret places of the stairs, shewe my thy sight, let me hear thy voice: for thy voyce is sweet, and thy sight comelie.

- 8 q For your spiritual beauty and excellency there was no worldly treasure to be compared unto you.
- 11 r The Church rejoices that she is admitted to the company of Christ. 12 s He shall be most dear unto me.

- 14 t Christ accepts his Church and commends her beauty.
- 15 u That is, the heart of the faithful wherein Christ dwells by his Spirit.

# Chapter 2

- 2 a Thus Christ prefers his Church above all other things.
- 3 b The spouse testifies her great desire toward her husband, but her strength fails her, and therefore she desires to be comforted, and felt it. 7 c Christ charges them which have to do in the Church, as it were by a solemn oath, that they trouble not the quietness thereof.

8 They all handle the sword, and are expert in war, every one hath his sword upon his thigh for the fear <sup>9</sup>by night.

9 King Salomón made himself a 'palace of the trees of Lebanón. 10 He made the pillars thereof of silver, *and* the pavement thereof of gold, the hangings thereof of purple, whose middes was paved with the love of the daughters of Jerusalém.

11 Come forth, ye haughters of Zión, and behold the King Salomón with the crown, wherewith his mother crowned him in the day of his marriage, & in the day of the gladness of his heart.

- 10 <sup>g</sup>I am a wall and my breasts *are* as towers: then was I in his eyes as one that findeth peace.
- 11 hSalomón had a vine in Baal-hamón: he gave the vineyard unto kepers: every one bringeth forth the fruit thereof a thousand pieces of silver.
- 12 But my vineyard which is mine, is before me: to thee, ô Salomón, apperteineth a thousand pieces of silver, and two thousand to them that keep the fruit thereof.
- 13 O thou that dwellest in the gardens, the companions hearken unto thy voice: cause me to hear it.
